It's Panto Time! The most wonderful time of the year! The Stars Come Out in Sleeping Beauty: A Musical Panto at People's Light

T'S MAGIC TIME AT PEOPLE'S LIGHT! TIME FOR WATCHING another original, music-filled, joyfully outrageous Holiday Panto, a beloved and much anticipated annual event.

Inspired by the British tradition, where the panto form came into its own, creative teams at People's Light take a well-known folk or fairytale and turn it on its ear. This year, Panto yeteran coauthors Samantha Reading and Pete Pryor, along with newcomer Alex Bechtel, chose *Sleeping Beauty* for the Panto's madcap chaos.

But this isn't your grandmother's Sleeping Beauty. In the 1959 Disney version of a tale that can be traced back to the 1300s, the main character—who has all of 18 lines—is given the gifts of beauty and song by fairies.

The Panto's Princess Aurora—with more than 120 lines—is given old television antennae by her Aunt Tikki, who trades in antiques (get it?), so Aurora can build a laser interferometer to "listen to space." And the Princess's engineering and astronomy aspirations aren't confined to a medieval castle, but are set in the soulful and pulsing world of 1960s rock 'n' roll.

Inspired by the recording industry and lives of studio musicianssuch as the Wrecking Crew and the Swampers in Muscle Shoals, Alabama—Panto creators set this story in the mythical swampland of Paoli Shoals and infused it with the music and spirit of that era.

Instead of a spinning wheel spindle, the very bad fairy Chanteuse (whose look and behavior are inspired by bad boy Keith Richards) declares the prick of a record player needle will be Princess Aurora's doom. Record needles are banned for 16 years, and so the fate of Aurora and the music of the land are bound together.

The People's Light Panto turns 13 this year, and like any teenager, the Panto makers are challenging boundaries. Pete Pryor, director of the past eight Pantos, asserts: "We push ourselves to keep innovating. We're not interested in repeating ourselves." So in addition to a complete revision of this story's presumed setting, co-writer Samantha Reading has thrown the Moon, the Stars and the Sun into the narrative. These ethereal and cosmic bodies are characters that expand the world beyond the swamp and into the sky. And we can dream even bigger.

These new frontiers are also anchored by Panto traditions that audiences have come to love:

• The Dame: a larger-than-life mother figure played by a man in spectacular dresses

• A basic story of good vs. evil, with a heroine to cheer! And a villain to boo!

• A "messy bit": a slapstick routine that's anything but clean, orderly or predictable

- A "candy bit": when candy is thrown into the audience
- Music, dance and local references

• And last, but most important of all, audience participation, which is what truly lifts the Panto into the cosmos!

The essential alchemy of the Panto, however, is not necessarily found on the stage. Actor Mark Lazar, who's played the Dame since Pantos began at People's Light, says Pantos bring two and even three generations into the same room, all leaning into a story and laughing together. "That's what I'm most proud of," Lazar affirms.

After all, isn't that the real magic of the holiday season? •

POPULAR CHOICES

The Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead

One of the most talked about books of the year, it's also one of a few highly recommended books with different takes on race and slavery in America (along with Yaa Gyasi's moving "Homegoing" and Ben H. Winters' scarily realistic "Underground Airlines") in a year when we're waking up to how much work is ahead of our Nation on this important topic. This book takes the metaphor out of the Underground Railroad and our protagonist discovers new worlds at each stop on the literal railway system the story is built around.

A Gentleman in Moscow by Amor Towles A bookseller favorite, this novel from "Rules of Civility" author Amor Towles brings to life the story of Count Alexander Rostov, who's sentenced to house arrest in

a grand hotel across from the Kremlin. A diverse cast of characters are forced to intermingle and learn a bit of empathy during their confinement, with poignance and not a little humor.

Moonglow by Michael Chabon

The more experimental reader on your list may enjoy this novel based on the Pulitzer Prize-winning author's real-life grandfather's deathbed confessions. Described as a story of truth and lies, family legends and existential adventure, this is speculative fiction meets existential autobiography. You can expect to see this on the New York Times Bestseller List. (Released Nov. 22)

FOR YOUNG(ER) READERS

Capture Your Style: Transform Your Instagram Images, Showcase Your Life, and Build the Ultimate Platform by Aimee Song Be the cool aunt and give the young adult who confuses you by taking no fewer than 23 pictures of her shoes in the middle of family events Aimee Song's "Capture Your Style." Of the Instagram style pack, Song is one of the most role-model-worthy young women on the scene. She assures readers "there is no such thing as a wrong outfit as long as you're authentic" and dishes equal proportions of easy-to-follow technical guidelines

Crooked Kingdom by Leigh Bardugo

Young Adult readers (but don't limit this audience by age; as a literary genre, YA spans decades) will be well aware of Leigh Bardugo's work with the Grisha Trilogy and eagerly anticipating this follow-up to "Six of Crows." This pick will be a hit especially if they enjoy a dose of fantasy in their fiction. And if they're equally as enamored of "Game of Thrones" and soapy teen dramas, you may even get a thank-you note.

Ada Twist, Scientist by Andrea Beaty If you're looking for a children's book Andrea Beaty's recently released "Ada Twist, Scientist" fulfills your obligation to encourage art, reading and STEM subjects equally. If you'd like to bestow a cute, quirky and inspiring library, add Beaty's previous two books "Iggy Peck, Architect" and "Rosie Revere, Engineer." Kids learn about a variety of professions with colorful, graphic illustration and lovable characters.

The Popcorn Princess by Jacqueline McComas For even younger readers, this book from

a local author has the added gift of proceeds going to Royer-Greaves School for Blind in Paoli. Enjoy the story of Penelope, who loves popcorn so much she puts it in her swimming pool! You'll find much more than just paintings, and you'll have plenty of choices more meaningful than a generic gift card that's never used. Plus local artists and galleries will sing your praises!

ONE OF A KIND

Our overly commercialized holiday culture begs for something with a little more intention. When you gift art, the artists' personalities and style are infused into their creations, producing a personal, memorable gift that you can't find anywhere else.

"You're giving something that no one else has. That's special," says Paul Downie at Community Arts Center in Wallingford. "By carefully selecting artwork just for them, you're telling them you think they're special too!" Make shopping easy with unique handmade fine jewelry and pottery from the Potters Guild and the region's finest artists at the CAC Handcrafted Holiday Sale from December 2 to 10.

In addition to being unique, art can "tell a story, share a memory or an experience that's meaningful to the recipient," notes Sandra Riper from Sunset Hill Jewelers & Fine Art Gallery in West Chester. Maybe an image reminds your loved one of a trip you took together or a painting's message is one you know they'll enjoy seeing every day. A FEW OF MY FAVORITE THINGS ABOUT CHRISTMAS IN WEST CHESTER

HAT MAKES THE HOLIDAYS SO ANTICIPATED? Treasured traditions, seasonal fun, the special charm that fills our local towns. There are plenty of distinctive towns to choose from this holiday season. But you'll understand why I'd like to share some of the reasons you should consider including West Chester in your holiday outings.

For unique shopping, a spectacular Christmas parade and holiday events to fill the month to the brim with activity and fun, West Chester should be on your holiday calendar.

UNIQUE HOLIDAY SHOPPING

This year, the holiday shopping season boasts new shops in downtown West Chester that reflect the individual touch that only local, family owned businesses can create—a hallmark of small-town America. That spirit is alive and well in the heart of the Brandywine Valley.

By popular demand, the Chester County Historical Society (CCHS) revived one of its finest traditions. The Holiday and Greens Sale offers an array of beautiful and affordable handcrafted wreaths, floral arrangements, ornaments, garlands and more, all made by talented CCHS volunteers and with proceeds benefiting the museum and library. DIYers will find bags of dried and fresh greens so they can do what they love and create their own decorations. Mark your calendar for Friday and Saturday, December 9 & 10, from 9:30 to Here's to looking good at every turn in your life. 4:30 at 225 N. High St.

While you're there, drop into the CCHS Gift Shop, where you'll find books on local history-great stocking stuffers. Some new releases with local connections: "West Chester: Images of Modern America" by Bruce and Melissa A. Mowday. And by the late CCHS President Rob Lukens and wife Rebecca, "Man With a Backpack," a chronicle of Rob's journey from diagnosis to finding a visionary, spiritual guide to help him through his fatal illness.

NEW SHOPS TO VISIT

Ladies, is there a man in your life who's prone to regrettable fashion statements? You'll find the cure at Phineas Gage, a new men's store offering stylish vet casual menswear, at 29 S. High St. Originally, the store was to be named "Phinehas Eachus," after the bartender who opened a tavern in 1762 in what became West Chester. But unbeknownst to owner Jaime Weisbrot, Wikipedia (usually such a reliable source) incorrectly led her to believe that Phineas Gage opened the first tavern. Gage was a young man with a much higher historical distinction than Wikipedia credits him for. In fact, Phineas Gage is known for surviving an 1848 accident in which a large iron rod was driven completely through his head. "It's a great story of a handsome man experiencing an unfortunate turn in his life with style and class," says Jaime. And so "Phineas Gage" became the name. Stop in for "a wide selection of popular styles from an array of American designers."

In the floors above Phineas Gage, women will find Emily Alice Salon, which relocated from a few doors down the block. "We tie together all the components that contribute to making you look and feel like your best self," says owner Emily Alice Ryan. Besides hair styling there are organic enzyme peels, makeup lessons, custom hair painting, lashes, image consulting, Pilates and more.

Both stores would make great "Girl's Night Out" adventures.

For unique design, head for Tesoro, Italian for "treasure," located a few doors away. This custom-only leather company was started in 2013 by Brit Reed, who later teamed up with Emily Pisano. The two entrepreneurs have grown Tesoro into what it is today.

Gay St. Rachel describes the shop as a "Mom-Mom, Mommy and Me Boutique with sizes from newborn-6 months, 6 months-6 years, tween sizes 7-16, and women's sizes small-3x." Now you can find formal wear at Sabrina Ann Couture, West Chester's spot for brides-to-be and other special occasion formal wear, at 128 N. High St. They've quickly become a welcome part of the downtown community with finely curated samples and never-worn bridal and evening gowns.

This is the second location for owner Sabrina Sigler, who opened in Ardmore in 2004. West

MAJOR CHALLENGE IN NAVIGATING THE HOLIDAYS is choosing just the right gift for each person on your list. For grown-ups, wine is a great and personalized choice that just pout everyone can appreciate. But with so many different styles and vintages, how do you know what to buy? And for the kids on your list ... you need to find another source for advice!

Here are some recommendations to give you ideas and inspiration for what to buy this season. And here's hoping this makes your trip to your local wine store a little easier and more enjoyable.

or those who love sweeter wines, pick up Aclesso Cagnina di Romagna Dolce 2015 (\$9.99). This great-value red wine is made from 100% Refosco from Le Rocche Malatestiane, by a wine cooperative with 990 vine-growing members in Italy's Emilia-Romagna region, south of Venice. Adesso is a low-alcohol, medium-bodied red with flavors of raspberry, cherry and spice that's easy to drink, with medium sweetness.



desso ...

ost wine drinkers-especially experimental millennials-L like a variety of types of wine, so the options are great. Since reds and fortified wines are generally best suited for the colder months, why not start there?

Doña Paula Estate Black Edition Red Blend Lujan de Cuyo 2013 (90 points James Suckling*, \$14.99), from a sub-region of Mendoza in Argentina, combines the appeal of malbec and red blends-both very hot right now. A heavy, dark blend of 60% malbec, 37% cabernet sauvignon and 3% petit verdot, this wine will please California cabernet lovers, malbec

enthusiasts and Bordeaux fans alike with aromas and flavors of herbs, plum, spices, blueberries and red pepper. These flavors are complemented by silky tannins and a long finish.

DOÑA PAULA

For the wine connoisseur or collector on your list, you may want something truly special. Joseph Phelps Vineyard Insignia Napa Valley 2013 (100 points Wine Advocate, \$219.99) marks the 40th vintage of this world-renowned Napa Valley red Bordeaux blend. In my opinion, it may be the best in recent years, though the 2011 and 2012 that are still in stores are stunning as well.

The 2013 Insignia is a blend of 88% cabernet sauvignon, 5% petit verdot, 3% merlot, 3% malbec and 1% cabernet franc aged for 24 months in 100% new oak barrels. A deep, inky purple, this wine expresses aromas of blackberry, plum, flowers and espresso. Rich,

concentrated flavors of dark fruit, vanilla bean, black pepper and chocolate combine with elegant tannins and well-integrated wood for a powerful experience. For optimal drinking, wait at least five to six years for the tannins to open up more fully. This beauty should continue to age well for up to 30 to 40 years.

f course, many people prefer whites and drink them year round. The most popular white varietal is chardonnay and it's an easy go-to if you're not sure what style a person prefers. Aged in 45% new French oak, 45% second-use French oak, and 10% stainless steel, Duckhorn Vineyards Char-

donnay Napa Valley 2013 (90 points Wine Enthusiast, \$31.99) is classic California style, done very elegantly. This wine has aromas of ripe peach, melon and lime with a hint of vanilla and pecan pie dough. On the palate, this wine is medium-bodied and complex, with well-balanced acidity and flavors of apple, pear, lemon and sweet oak leading to a silky, long finish.

Another fantastic choice for white wine lovers is a sauvignon blanc. Greywocke Souvignon Blanc Marlborough 2015 (91 points Wine Enthusiast, \$21.99) is a newer endeavor by Kevin Judd, the founder and winemaker behind Cloudy Bay. He allowed a portion of the juice for this wine to undergo spontaneous natural yeast fermentation, which adds complexity. Aromas of ripe pear, peach, apple, passion fruit and lemon jump out of the glass, with subtle notes of jasmine following. The palate is silky with intense flavors of fresh grass, stone fruits, melons and oranges.

V7 hether you need a bottle for ringing in the New Year, toasting W an engagement, celebrating a family gathering, or just mixing a mimosa at brunch, some occasions simply demand sparkling wine. Made from pinot noir grapes from ten grand cru villages in Montagne de Reims and Côte de Bouzy, Laurent-Perrier Brut Rosé NV (92 points Wine Spectator, \$79.99) is a beautiful, elegant Champagne. The gorgeous salmon color comes from the red grape skins staying in contact with the juice for three days before fermentation. The wine has an expressive bouquet of orange, raspberry, ginger, flowers and stone. The palate is dry, creamy and well-balanced, with fine bubbles and peach, almond, red raspberry, white pepper, chalk and baked bread flavors. It ends with a long, crisp, floral finish. This Champagne is delicious with a variety of hors d'oeuvres.

For sparkling cocktails or toasts with large groups, you don't need to spend a fortune. Cava is a great choice because it's delicious and inexpensive, plus the bubbles stand up well to mixing!

Biutiful Cava Brut Nature NV (88 points Wine Enthusiast, \$11.99) is a lively blend of 80% macabeo and 20% chardonnay from north-facing vineyards in Requena, Spain. Aged in the bottle for 15 months on the yeast cells, it has citrus and green apple aromas with a hint of celery and toast. On the palate, the wine is full and citrusy with bright tangerine, grapefruit and lime flavors and a long, crisp finish.

Feast of the Seven Fishes

ENJOY A CHRISTMAS EVE TRADITION RIVALING THE NEXT DAY'S DINNER. OR, AS MY AUNTS WOULD SAY, 'IT WON'T KILL YOU TO TRY A FRIED SMELT!'

KNOW IT IS NOT POLITICALLY CORRECT TO STEREOTYPE. but one thing I love about Italians-including my father's side of the family-is their ability to turn sacrifice into pleasure. Traditionally, La Vigilia (Christmas Eve) is a day when many Catholics abstain from eating meat before receiving communion at Christmas Mass. The Italian response? Put on the Feast of the Seven Fishes, a celebration that rivals Christmas Day dinner in abundance, flavor and the spirit of la dolce vita.

But getting such a banquet on the table involves a great deal of work-or at the very least, a great deal of planning and ordering-so before you decide whether to cook the Feast at home or to dine out on Christmas Eve, it's helpful to hear from the pros.

At La Verona in downtown Kennett Square, co-owner Jack Mavraj and executive chef Gilles Moret have hosted the Feast of the Seven Fishes every Christmas Eve since 2012.

Mavraj is a native of Italy who grew up in Munich and moved with his family to the U.S. nearly two decades ago. He's celebrated the Feast ever since childhood. Before settling in Pennsylvania, he brought the tradition to his previous restaurants on Long Island and Manhattan. Moret hails from France and did his culinary training in Paris.

While Mavraj and Moret tweak the \$65 prix fixe menu every year, it always includes a soup, salad, pasta, main dish and dessert. Diners at the 2015 dinner savored lobster bisque; fried calamari and smelts with tomato pesto and fresh tomato sauce; grilled octopus salad; capellini with clams and sardines; and sautéed bronzino in a lemon white wine sauce accompanied by risotto and escarole. Housemade tiramisu and cannoli sweeten the meal's end. La Verona's regular menu is also available on Christmas Eve, so you can have that chicken Parmesan Vice President Joe Biden ordered when he visited in July.

For cooks who want to host the Feast at home, Mavraj and Moret generously shared a few of their recipes and advice. While it's a given that you should buy from a reputable purveyor, be sure to

choose fish with shiny, not cloudy, eyes and bright red gills. When selecting octopus and smelts, purchase small ones: they are easier to work with and more tender. The same applies to clams, making little necks a good choice for the meal.

Most of all, whether cooking or eating, be open-minded. In other words, as my Italian aunts would say, "It won't kill you to try a fried smelt!" (For the record, not only did it not kill me but fried smelts became one of my favorite Christmas Eve dishes.)

Exotique Sauce

This is a jazzed up version of Thousand Island dressing that makes a flavorful dipping sauce for chilled shrimp. Adapted from a 1996 Zanne Stewart recipe in Gourmet. V2 C. mayonnaise 3 Tb. ketchup 11/2 Tb. Cognac 2–3 tsp. lime juice Pinch of salt Few dashes of hot sauce (Tabasco or other) Whisk all ingredients together and chill for 1–2 hours. Makes a generous V2 C.

Mignonette Sauce

A classic sauce for oysters. You can make this sauce days in advance. In fact, the longer it sits, the better because the shallots will have a chance to mellow.

½ C. champagne vinegar ½ C. minced shallots

1/2 tsp. fresh coarsely ground white pepper Pinch of kosher salt Pinch of sugar

Whisk all ingredients together. Refrigerate at least 4 hours. Taste and adjust seasonings.

Makes enough for 2–3 dozen oysters on the half shell.

Feast by the Numbers

Celebrity chef Mario Batali jokes that the Feast of the Seven Fishes is "what Italians do when they say they're fasting." Some families, he notes, even indulge in as many as 13 fishes! Other families limit the seafood dishes to 3. But what's behind the numbers? Food historians disagree, but here is a smorgasbord of theories to chew on.

3: the Wise Men; the Holy Trinity

7: the days of the week, the sacraments of the Roman Catholic church; the seven deadly sins (Gluttony, anyone?); the hills surrounding Rome

11: the 12 apostles minus Judas13: the 12 apostles plus Jesus

3 Tb. chopped garlic

2 C. clam juice

C. white wine
 butter
 Tb. flour, plus more for dusting sardines
 Crushed red pepper flakes, to taste
 small sardine filets
 lb. angel hair (fresh or dry)
 lemons, cut in half
 C. chopped parsley



To clean the clams: In a large bowl, toss the clams with a little bit of kosher salt. Add water halfway up the clams and swish around. Change water 2 or 3 times. Lift clams out of the water, leaving any grit behind. Discard clams with broken shells.

In a large saucepan, heat 3 Tb. olive oil with garlic over low heat. When the garlic is very light brown, add the clams, clam juice and white wine. Bring to a boil. Then reduce to a simmer. Cover and cook until the clams open, about 5 minutes. Discard any clams that do not open.

Mix butter and 2 Tb. flour together with your fingers or a fork. Add the butter-flour mixture and crushed red pepper flakes to the saucepan. Remove from heat and set aside.



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Rinse sardines under running water and pat dry. Lightly dust the sardines with flour. In a heated sauté pan with 1 Tb. olive oil, add the sardine filets skin side down first. Cook for 2 minutes each side. Remove pan from heat.

Cook the angel hair for 2 minutes in salted water. Drain and mix into clams in the saucepan.

Dish out onto large serving tray or individual serving plates with clams towards edge. Place the sardines next to the clams.

Arrange lemon halves around the platter and sprinkle chopped parsley all over. Makes 6 servings.

La Verona Octopus Salad

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- 1 lb. baby octopus
- 1 small carrot, chopped
- 1 rib celery, chopped
- 1 Tb. chopped onion
- 1 garlic clove

2 bulbs fennel

2 Tb. extra virgin olive oil Salt and pepper, to taste 1 tsp. fresh basil 1 tsp. fresh parsley 2 lemons 2 large heads radicchio 1/2 lb. baby arugula



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Wash octopus and blanch in a pot of boiling water for 30 minutes along with carrot, celery, onion and garlic. Remove octopus and place in an ice bath. Drain octopus, cut into 1-inch strips and place in the refrigerator.

Wash the fennel. Shave it on a mandoline or cut it by hand into 1/8-inch thick slices. Blanch in a fresh pot of boiling water for 1 minute. Remove fennel and place in an ice bath. Drain.

Heat extra virgin olive oil in a sauté pan set over low to medium heat. Add fennel, octopus, salt, pepper, basil, parsley and juice of 1 lemon. Cook just to heat through, about 1-2 minutes.

You can serve this dish family style on a large platter or on individual plates. Place radicchio leaves on the outside of platter and put arugula leaves in the center. Spoon octopus/fennel over the lettuces. Garnish with lemon wedges and serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.

..... Crab Pie

This recipe is a hybrid of two recipes I've kept in my "to try" binder for the last few years. I borrowed the sour cream crust from a Moravian chicken pie recipe printed in the December/January 2012 issue of Cook's Country magazine. I adapted the crab filling from a Penzey's Spices reader recipe. The pie is rich and celebratory—just right for Christmas Eve. It can be prepared a few days early and warmed up in the oven.

For the crust:

21/2 C. all purpose flour $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt 12 Tb. unsalted butter, cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ pieces and kept chilled 1/2 C. sour cream, chilled 1 large egg

For the filling: 1 Tb. butter ¹/₄ C. diced onion 1/4 C. diced celery 1/2 C. mayonnaise 2 Tb. flour 2 eggs, beaten $\frac{1}{2}$ C. whole milk 8 oz. lump crab meat, picked over to remove shells 8 oz. shredded cheese * 2 Tb. pimentos

2 tsp. Old Bay seasoning

* I used a Mexican blend that included mild cheddar and Monterey Jack. Feel free to use any mild cheeses you want. The trick is to not overpower the crab.

Surviving the Feast: Advice from a Home Cook

started hosting the Feast at my house 10+ years ago. What began as an intimate sitlown dinner for 5 has evolved into a raucous buffet for 15 to 20, meaning I've had to adjust the dishes and my expectations to keep from having a Christmas Eve meltdown. Here are the two most important tips I

1. Serve no more than two hot dishes. Without a lot of kitchen help and chafing dishes, it's impossible to keep too many hot foods at the right temperature.

2. Take shortcuts whenever you can. Seven fishes does not mean seven distinct courses, so go ahead and whip up a fish stew or seafood lasagna.

Easier still, assemble a raw bar: buy cooked shrimp with the shells already removed and get the oysters and clams shucked at the store. (Lots of places do this free of charge.)

Then, all you have to do is whisk together a couple of sauces and uncork the Prosecco.

Pulse flour and salt together in a food processor. Add butter to flour mixture and pulse until you get pea-size pieces.

Whisk together sour cream and egg in another bowl. Add half of sour cream mix-

On a lightly floured surface, knead

discs. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least an hour or overnight, until dough is firm. You need only 1 disk for this recipe, so freeze the remaining one for another use.

To make the filling and assemble:

Preheat oven to 350°. Melt butter in a small skillet over medium heat. Add onions and celery and cook for 2-3 minutes until they start to soften but do not turn golden. Set aside to cool.





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In a large bowl, mix mayonnaise, flour, eggs and milk together. Stir in crab meat, cheese, pimentos, onions and celery and Old Bay and mix until combined.

Roll out dough and press into bottom and up the sides of a 10-inch pie plate. Spoon in crab mixture and bake until set in the middle and golden brown on top, about 40-50 minutes. If crust or top starts to brown too quickly, cover loosely with aluminum foil.

Makes 6 main dish servings.

Spaghetti with Anchovies

Every Christmas Eve on their way to midnight Mass, my Uncle Pat and Aunt Mary delivered a large bowl of spaghetti with anchovies to my father. Although this was decades ago, I still remember smelling the garlic seconds before the doorbell rang. This spaghetti is true peasant food-simple, flavorful and easily adjusted to your taste. If you love garlic and capers, add more. If you have a fresh tomato on hand, dice and toss it in the sauce.

1 lb. spaghetti, dried or fresh 2, 4.25 oz. jars rolled anchovies with capers in olive oil, drained 5-6 Tb. olive oil* $1\frac{1}{2}$ -2 Tb. minced garlic (or more if you love garlic!) ³/₄ C. chopped parsley 2–3 Tb. capers, optional Grated Parmesan cheese, optional Freshly ground black pepper, optional

* You can use the olive oil from the anchovies and add your own to make 5 Tb. but depending on the brand of anchovies you use, the olive oil might not be full-bodied enough.

Cook spaghetti in a large pot of salted boiling water until al dente.

While spaghetti cooks, heat olive oil over medium heat in a large skillet. Add garlic and cook for a minute. Reduce heat to medium low. Add the rolled anchovies and cook for another 2-3 minutes, breaking up anchovies with the back of a spatula. The anchovies will almost become liquefied.

Using tongs, lift spaghetti directly out of cooking water and place in skillet. Add parsley and extra capers if using and toss to evenly distribute sauce. (I leave the skillet on low heat while I'm doing this.)

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Serve with freshly grated Parmesan cheese and freshly ground black pepper if desired. Makes 6-8 servings. \blacklozenge

CAR MAKERS HAVE TO ASK, WHAT DO WOMEN WANT?

E CAN ONLY IMAGINE THE ANTICIPATION IN the Dodge showrooms that day in 1955, when the carmaker from Auburn Hills, Michigan unveiled the newest addition to their lineup. "La Femme" wasn't just a new model, it was the key to capturing the hearts of female car buyers, then emerging as a whole new market in the tradition of costs twice as much as the standard \$40,000 Evoque. Rosie the Riveter.

The new Dodge beckoned to women in a number of ways, not all of them subtle. There was the color scheme—pink on the outside and "orchid jacquard" on the inside. Since women, it was thought, love to accessorize, "La Femme" came with a color coordinated pink purse, umbrella and raincoat, comb, compact, lipstick case and cigarette lighter. It was, as its ads had it, "The first and only car designed for Her Majesty, the modern American woman."

Only, as it turned out, the American woman didn't want to be courted like some proto-Barbie doll, so La Femme turned out to be La Flop. The car was pulled from production the very next year.

Since then the female car market has become bigger than ever, with women buying more than 65% of all new vehicles and decisively influencing 93% of all vehicle purchases.

But what do women want? Millions of dollars hang on the answer and the answers range from the obvious to the fanciful.

You might think an all-wheel-drive SUV descended from vehicles built for prowling the African savannah might target males. But

not when it's a Range Rover Special Edition Evoque. The brainchild of Spice Girl Victoria Beckham, the Special Edition's interior comes with an abundance of rose-gold accents, vintage tan leather upholstery to remind its lucky passengers of La Beckham's time in California, and a four-piece set of matching luggage. Of course, it

Interestingly some men have found themselves unwittingly at the wheel of a car that signals the opposite gender. That's the premise of one episode of "Seinfeld," when the comedian has an altercation with another driver who says, sneeringly, that he'd never seen a man driving a Saab convertible before.

Beetle buyers of the late 1990s often confronted the same conundrum. When the German subcompact first arrived on these shores





it was gender neutral-the epitome of cheap transportation for the masses. But with its redesign in 1998, it morphed into something more cartoony and cutesy, plus its built-in flower vase left no doubt of its girly intentions.

Fourteen years later Volkswagen exorcized that feminine image with a Beetle that was longer and lower, with bigger wheels and bigger engine, and sales to men soared.

And what can we say of the Dodge Caravan mini-van that hasn't already been said? Its practicality and capacity-the same attributes that made it the favorite of contractors and delivery men-eventually made it synonymous with soccer moms and the antithesis of manly cool.

In 2011 Dodge tried to recast its "ballet class and brownies" image by making it more powerful, lower to the ground, giving it a more powerful engine and wider tires, dark leather interior, and dubbing it the "man van." For 2017 Dodge replaces the Caravan with the Chrysler Pacifica.

Shopaholics will appreciate such conveniences as side doors that slide open at the touch of a button and a tailgate that lifts with the kick of a foot. The Pacifica's Parallel Park Assist is capable of locating a space and then-using ultrasonic parking sensors instead of craning your neck around and spinning the wheel this way and that-steering the van into place. Moms who have ever had to lug a vacuum cleaner out to the car to clean up cookie crumbs from a carload of kids will love the Stow'n Vac, the vacuum cleaner built into the Pacifica's side.

For some carmakers, appealing to women seems to be second nature. If you were to somehow combine all those virtues prized by women-safety, practicality, comfort and value-you might get a vehicle that looks a lot like a Volvo.



For years, the Swedish marque has prided itself as one of the safest and most reliable on the road. It was a pioneer in the use of threepoint safety belts and crumple zones, and now Volvo plans to raise the bar on this tradition with a pledge to make the car free of any fatal accidents or serious injuries by the year 2020.

Regardless of gender, even better than walking away from an accident is avoiding one, and the Volvo XC90 makes this all the more likely with a boat load of new driver-assist systems. Its new City Safety system tells when vehicles, bikes or pedestrians are on the road ahead, while its Cross Traffic Alert warns of oncoming traffic up to 230 feet in advance. The Pilot Assist system is ideal for stop-and-go driving, as it will brake and accelerate to match traffic speed while steering in line with the car ahead up to 30 mph.

For faster highway speeds, Volvo offers an Adaptive Cruise Control with automatic braking. It's all in keeping with the kind of engineering we've come to expect from Sweden, even if Volvo's current owners—the Zhejiang Geely Holding Group—are based in China.

Paradoxically, one marque that's found a loyal following among women was originally designed for GI Joe. And where other marques stress new features and sleeker designs, the Jeep Wrangler lures with sheer immutability and ruggedness.

"A Jeep-any Jeep-stands out on its own," says Ana Sieracki-Carter, proud owner of a 2006 Grand Cherokee and who represents the brand at Courtesy Jeep in Chester County. "You feel powerful in a Jeep. You feel like an individual. It's iconic. It's a hot convertible or an off-road vehicle. You can accessorize it any way you want. You can paint it in camouflage or in pink. It looks great either way. You can add big gnarly wheels or even add a snorkel for crossing deep water."

Most people, she says, like to express how they feel about their Jeep with a bumper sticker. An especially popular one, she explains, goes: "Silly boys, Jeeps are for girls." ♦
