on't let the sharp, industrialsounding name fool you. Known for its generous variety of shopping environments, Exton and its residents have recognized the potential in their town and have been developing the area into a destination with a bit of everything, including excitement.

Named for the X-crossing of Routes 30 and 100 (X-town), Exton has taken well to its role as a crossroads town. Over the years, it's been home to historic houses, businesses and generations of families.

For example, the **Zook House** (c. 1734) was home to eight generations of that family and sat on the spot of the present-day Exton Square Mall. Restored in the 1970s and relocated in the late '90s, the house is now available for viewing.

Since then, the locals of Exton have launched a revival of their home, promising a wealth of charming nature walks, summer events, expansive shopping and satisfying restaurants.

What to Do

Whether you want a relaxing stroll, an afternoon on the water or other fun, Exton and the surrounding area offer plenty of options. Exton and its northern neighbor Lionville-Marchwood have been developing a series of interconnected walking trails, woven through the shopping centers, residential neighborhoods, and alongside the streams and ponds dotting the township. Thus far, large swatches of the Chester Valley and Uwchlan Trails have been completed, with connecting sections in the works.

Northwest of Main Street and the Exton Square Mall, you'll find Marsh Creek State Park, highlighted by Marsh Creek Lake at its heart. On the lake's east side, Marsh Creek Watersports offers rentals for all your favorite activities on the water. Canoes, kayaks, paddleboats, sailboats, windsurfers and fishing rods are all available for rent. MarshCreek-Lake.com.







The Beauty of Bare Root Trees

The Delaware Center for Horticulture

Plan now to add trees to your yard — for shade next year and increased property values. And plan to use easy and affordable bare root trees.

ugust in the Delaware Valley is often a month of oppressive heat, creating a longing for autumn and relief from bank-breaking air conditioning bills. But August days also offer an opportunity to plan for cooler and less costly summers to come.

How, you ask? By deciding where to plant bare root trees strategically around your home. More than half of a building's heat gain comes from sunlight shining through windows. Bare root trees are the cheapest and easiest way to shade your property in the summer, while letting in the warmth of winter sunshine. Here's what you need to know.

Some Planning

Although you'll have to wait for cooler weather before bringing a tree home, start planning now. Walk around outside and decide where to plant. Look for a site where a tree would give afternoon shade on southwest-facing walls, if planted about 25 to 35 feet away. Correctly placed trees can reduce air conditioning needs by as much as 30 percent and decrease utility bills by 50 percent!

When placing a tree, also consider avoiding overhead wires and under-

ground utilities. Call 811, the "Call before you dig" number, to get free help and avoid bad surprises.


It's also a good idea to create cool shade over hard surfaces such as drive-ways and patios that reflect and radiate heat. And air conditioning units in the shade of a tree run more efficiently, as long as there's plenty of space for good air circulation.

How to Get Your Bare Root Tree

Bare root trees are harvested by shaking the dirt off the root system, then dipping roots in a protective gel that keeps them moist. (This revolutionary gel technique has made it possible to have large trees in bare root form.) You'll get a tree with most of its original fluffy roots intact (see photo next page), and without the risk of the crowded, circling tangle of roots often found with container-grown trees.

With all those exposed roots, however, bare root trees need to be planted within a few days after shipping from the nursery. Unfortunately, most garden centers can't carry a plant with such a short shelf life.

That's why the Delaware Center for Horticulture (TheDCH) in Wilmington can help. TheDCH is one of the only



local retail sources to offer bare root trees to the public.

Each fall and spring, TheDCH selects an assortment of trees that thrive in the Delaware Valley and makes a limited number of bare root trees available for sale. Recent popular varieties have included Maple, Serviceberry, Redbud, Hophornbeam, Linden, Honey Locust, and Crabapple.

When to Plant Your Bare Root Tree

The best time to plant trees is after the leaves have dropped but the ground isn't yet frozen. Planting trees when they are dormant causes the least transplant shock.

Pre-ordered bare root trees will be dug and delivered to Wilmington in late October (deadline for ordering is Sept. 16; go the TheDCH.org for details). When the trees arrive from the nursery, TheDCH provides a free workshop to ensure your success in planting, mulching and caring for your new tree. What could be easier •



Jean Oakes and Bob Poole have been friends, colleagues and ardent volunteers and community leaders for many years. We asked them to interview each other for this piece, which gives just a glimpse of their many overlapping and complementary contributions to our area.

Jean Marie Oakes

It has been my pleasure to know Jean Oakes since 1955 when I opened my office for the Family Practice of Medicine in West Chester. I believe she has done much good by virtue of the beauty, grace, cheer and loving kindness that she brings to each human relationship.

Jean's first love has always been The Chester County Hospital. She began working there in 1939 and, with a strong interest in the alleviation of suffering, she soon became office manager of the Bookkeeping Department. In 1955, she was promoted to become the Hospital's Vice President for Administration and later Executive Vice President, the position she held at her retirement in 1982. She is an Honorary Member of the Board of Directors today, meeting monthly to discuss the Hospital's business.

Perhaps best known among Jean's many accomplishments at the Hospital is her work with Chester County Day, now in its 71st year as a fundraising project of the Women's Auxiliary of the Hospital. Every year on the first Saturday in October, 35 or so homes, selected for their historical, architectural or cultural significance, are open for tours. Jean was Chester County Day's first official photographer, taking photos that became "the slide show" to introduce the homes to the public before the tours.

Jean always enjoyed "the Day," though the event required a great deal of work — and considerable hand-holding — to get the homes ready for tourgoers. This highlight of the fall season has been a great success, raising more than \$3.8 million for the nonprofit hospital. Jean's interest, energy and support fed that success story immeasurably.

Jean's contributions to the West Chester community, however, did not end with the Hospital. Among her many "firsts" was being the first woman to preside over the United Fund of Greater

West Chester (now United Way of Chester County). Jean has promoted philanthropic support for that host of social agencies for many years. She also served on the Advisory Board of the Salvation Army for 27 years, and served with the Chester County Art Association, Chadds Ford Historical Society, Chester County Historical Society and Rotary Club of West Chester.

A lifelong supporter of West Chester (and Chadds Ford, where she was born, along with four brothers), she has also received commemorative citations from a Pennsylvania Senator and a House member. Other honors include an award from the Soroptomists Club (an international organization working on women's issues) and a Japanese Flowering Cherry tree planted in Everhart Park in her honor by the Junior New Century Club.

Another highlight was when Jean competed in a television contest hosted by "The View" on behalf of West Chester against several cities. She came home with \$2000 in prize money for the West Chester Senior Center! It's not surprising that in 1977, Jean was named West Chester's Outstanding Citizen.

Robert Poole III, M.D.

Dr. Robert Poole is a modest man, so it is my pleasure to be able to share





the story of some of his achievements. Multi-talented, he has been my mentor in many ways. He is a devout member of the Presbyterian Church, an ordained Elder and a fervent fundraiser. From 1956 to 1979, he was also a teacher with the church school faculty.

In 1955, when I met him, Bob had just started a family practice in West Chester and joined the medical staff at the Chester County Hospital, where I worked. Making patient rounds, he was always pleasant, courteous and very professional. Young and handsome in his brown and white saddle shoes, he reminded me of Pat Boone — which is meant as a great compliment! Bob's patients loved him. His office was always filled and he even used to make house calls.

At the Hospital, Bob served as Chief of the Medical Staff from 1975 to 1977 and as a member of the Board of Directors from 1973 to 1997. A frequent volunteer, he received many awards for his humanitarian service. He was a member of the American Medical Association, the Pennsylvania Medical Society, as well as numerous other groups. In 1992, he was named Pennsylvania Family Physician of the Year by the American Academy of Family Practice, a crowning achievement for his profession.

Bob has been a dedicated member of the Rotary Club of West Chester, active for over 50 years, and serving as the

GLORIOUS FOOD FROM LOCAL FARM STANDS AND MARKETS

Bating well is often a matter of shopping well, and shopping well is never more pleasurable than in August when farm market tables grow heavy with fragrant melons, juicy tomatoes and crisp beans.

In the past few years, our region — not to mention our country — has witnessed a happy proliferation of farmers markets and farm stands. "Buy Fresh, Buy Local" posters are everywhere, as are "No Farms, No Food" bumper stickers.

But well before "locavore" entered the lexicon, West Chester Growers Market and Pete's Produce Farm in Westtown provided locals with the finest ingredients for no-fuss, healthy summer meals.

Pete Flynn has been a face on the local agriculture scene for over 25 years. He began as a dairy farmer in 1986, then moved on to planting corn and selling it from the back of his pick-up. In 2000, Pete decided to focus on growing produce, and Pete's Produce Farm was born.

On nearly 200 acres of Westtown School property, Pete and his crew cultivate more than 80 varieties of heirloom tomatoes and all manner of vegetables — notably Mirai corn so sweet that people often travel for miles just to pick up a dozen ears. Local chefs showcase his top-quality vegetables and fruits on their menus, and Pete's is the main supplier of produce to Westtown School.

Pete's also enriches the community in other ways. Not only does Pete Flynn

serve on the board of the Chester County Food Bank, he grows four acres of vegetables exclusively for those in need.

Just under five miles from Pete's is the West Chester Growers Market — "growers" being the operative word because all 24 vendors make or grow what they sell. Held Saturdays May through November (see sidebar for details), the WCGM was started in 1995 by small-scale farmers, like market manager Paul Hauser of Maple Hill Farm, who aimed to find an economically feasible way to sell directly to customers.

Now in its 17th season, the market is a mainstay of neighborhood life in West Chester. Each week, around two thousand shoppers gather downtown to purchase a dizzying variety of goods — artisanal cheese, humanely raised chicken, heirloom fruits and vegetables, preserves and pickles. Some of the goods, like Queen Farms' Chinese lettuce or The Chile Spot's idiosyncratic hot pepper jams, are largely unavailable at ordinary grocery stores.

But customers come for more than fresh ingredients. They come to exchange recipes with the farmers, so their kids can win popsicles in the fishing tournament or pet Highland Farms' sheep. In short, they come for community.

This August, when you're craving light, easy-to-prepare food, come to the tables of the farm markets right in your own backyard!

Pete's Fabulous Musik Candy Corn Salsa

Danni Hayes, Pete's market manager, says it's fine to substitute any other sweet onion, such as a Vidalia, for the Candy onion and any fresh garlic for the Musik variety. But to do the recipe justice, she strongly recommends using the Mirai corn and Fabulous tomatoes, both available at Pete's.

A Japanese hybrid with supersweet flavor, Mirai corn is so tender that Pete and his crew handpick it. A Fabulous tomato is a hybrid beefsteak similar in flavor to the traditional Jersey. A tomato's tomato, it's exceptionally sweet and tangy, needing no salt to enhance its flavor, and it has little or no core, giving you more tomato in every bite.

2 mature ears of Pete's sweet corn

4 Fabulous tomatoes

1/2 Candy onion

1 hot wax pepper (med. hot yellow chili) ½ cucumber

2 cloves Musik of garlic, pressed

or minced juice of 1 lime

4 Tb. fresh cilantro

sea salt, fresh ground pepper to taste

Blanch corn and carefully remove from the cob. Dice tomatoes, onion, pepper and cucumber. Combine with corn and add garlic. Roll lime to loosen juices, slice in half and squeeze over vegetable mixture. Add chopped cilantro. Season with salt and pepper. Mix gently. Makes 1½ cups.

Pete's Heirloom Tomato and Watermelon Salad

Enjoy this refreshing, easy-to-assemble salad immediately, before the fruit releases too much juice.

3/4 lb. watermelon, rind removed 2-6 heirloom tomatoes (different sizes and colors)

½ C. feta cheese, crumbled 8 fresh basil leaves

2 Tb. extra virgin olive oil sea salt, fresh ground pepper to taste lemon zest, freshly grated (optional)

Cut watermelon and tomatoes into large chunks and combine in a bowl. Crumble feta over watermelon/tomato mixture. Tear basil leaves by hand, and add to mixture. Add olive oil and toss gently. Season with salt, pepper and lemon zest, if desired. Makes 2½ cups.

Sylvia's Tacos Dorados de Queso (Crispy Tacos with Cheese)

When I visited the Highland Farm stand at the West Chester Growers Market, I overheard Hannah Johnston telling a customer about the delicious tacos her friend Sylvia makes with Highland brebis, a soft, spreadable sheep's milk cheese. She graciously sent me the recipe. Feel free to substitute soft goat cheese (chevre) or cow cheese (quark).

34 C. brebis

2 Tb. fresh oregano, cilantro, herbs de Provence or *epazote* (Mexican herb)

1/4 small yellow onion, cut into small dice

8-10 small (6-8 inch) corn tortillas vegetable oil salt

Add the herbs and onions to the cheese, mixing thoroughly to spread the flavors evenly throughout the cheese. Heat up the corn tortillas on a griddle or in the microwave (important so tortillas don't break when folded).

While tortillas warm, fill the bottom of a deep frying pan with ½ inch of vegetable oil. Heat oil to 350°-375°. Spread about 1 Tb. of the cheese mixture inside the tortilla and roll up into a long thin taco. Place the taco in the hot oil. Fry until light tan/light brown and crispy. Salt to taste and serve with salsa if you like. Makes 8-10 servings.

Mushroom Caviar*

Angela Evans, who owns Oley Valley Mushrooms with her husband, contributed this recipe to "Favorites from Our Market," the West Chester Growers Market cookbook. Spread the caviar on toast or crackers for an easy appetizer.

* The following recipes are from Favor-

ites from Our Market, the WCGM cookbook.

2 small onions, finely chopped

3 Tb. olive oil

3/4 lb. shitake or oyster mushrooms, finely chopped

1 Tb. lemon juice

2 Tb. sour cream

chopped chives, parsley or watercress

In a medium pan, sauté onions in olive oil. Add mushrooms and continue sauté until cooked through. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice and sour cream. Garnish with herbs or watercress. Makes 2-3 cups.

Chinese Lettuce Soup with Pork, Chicken or Beef*

Ed Yin of Queens Farm in West Chester explained that Chinese lettuce is crunchy and sweet. Its leaves and stems are perfect for stir-frys or this "stir-soup."

2 Tb. cooking oil

1 tsp. minced ginger or to taste

½ lb. lean pork, chicken or beef, cut into small pieces

2 Tb. soy sauce

1 lb. Chinese lettuce, cut in small pieces 3 tsp. salt

1 C. water/8 oz. water

Heat a large wok over high heat. Add oil and ginger and cook for 1-2 minutes. Add meat and stir fry 2-3 minutes or until meat turns from red to pink. Add soy sauce and cook for another 2-3 minutes. Add lettuce, salt and water. Bring to a boil.

Cover and continue to boil for 10 minutes or until lettuce stems turn soft. Makes 2-4 servings.

Green Bean and Potatoes Salad*

One of the original farmer-vendors at WCGM, Carol Hauser owns and operates Maple Hill Farm in Lincoln University with her husband Paul, the WCGM manager. Her potato salad is light and healthy alternative to the mayonnaise-dressed version. Served warm or cold.

2 lb. red potatoes, cut in large chunks 1 lb. green beans





Brandywine Roots

Some of the delicious produce grown at Pete's originated in the Brandywine

Sudduth Strain Brandywine Tomatoes are a pink-fleshed heirloom variety known for their large fruit and intense flavor. Legend has it that when Doris Sudduth Hill and her family moved from our area to Tennessee in the late 1800s, they took the seeds with them and grew these tomatoes in their new home state for the next 100 years.

Landis Valley Strain Brandywine Red Tomatoes were originally cultivated in 1885 in Chester County. These 8-12 ounce tomatoes are prized for their vibrant red color and depth of flavor.

Dr. Martin's Lima Beans were developed in the 1920s by a local dentist, Dr. Harold Martin, at his small farm along Street Road in Westtown. Local blogger Curtis Roberts, who writes an art/culture blog (acaravan.blogspot.com), raves about the beans. He was kind enough to share his recipe.

Greek Style Lima Beans

11/2 C. shelled Dr. Martin Lima beans

1 C. water

4 Tb. extra-virgin olive oil

2-3 Tb. chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley 1-11/2 Tb. minced garlic

½ tsp. salt.

Cook lima beans, water, 2 tablespoons oil, 1 tablespoon parsley, garlic, and salt in a 2-quart heavy saucepan, tightly covered, over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until beans are tender, 17 to 20 minutes.

Season with salt and pepper and transfer to a bowl. Serve sprinkled with remaining tablespoon parsley and drizzled with remaining tablespoon oil. Makes 1½ cups.

1/4 C. red wine vinegar

4 green onions, sliced

2 Tb. fresh herbs (cook's choice)





beans and cook for 7 minutes longer or until potatoes are tender. Drain.

In a large bowl, whisk vinegar, onions, herbs, mustard, olive oil, salt and pepper together. Add potatoes and green beans, tossing gently to coat. Makes 8-10 servings.

Lemon-Zucchini Tea Bread*

Garrison Keillor jokes that the only time Lake Wobegone residents lock their cars is in August because they're worried neighbors will leave zucchini on their seats. This quick bread recipe from the Favorites from Our Market Cookbook would have even taciturn Lake Wobegonians throwing wide their car doors.

3½ C. flour, sifted

3/4 tsp. baking powder

1½ tsp. salt

34 tsp. baking soda

2 tsp. lemon peel, grated

2 C. sugar

1 C. vegetable oil

1 tsp. vanilla

4 large eggs

2 C. zucchini, grated

1 C. chopped nuts

1 C. golden raisins

Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, mix together flour, baking powder, salt, baking soda and lemon peel. Set aside.

In another large bowl, beat together sugar, oil and vanilla until combined. Thoroughly beat in eggs, one at a time. Alternate stirring in flour mixture and zucchini. Stir in nuts and raisins.

Bake in a buttered loaf pan for 45 minutes or until cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Turn out on a wire rack and cool completely. Makes 1 loaf.

Peach Pound Cake*

Who knew pound cake could be improved upon? In this recipe, Carol Hauser of Maple Hill Farm highlights the fuzzy fruit.

1 C. butter, softened

3 C. sugar

6 eggs

3 C. flour

¼ tsp. baking powder

34 tsp. salt

½ C. sour cream

2 C. peeled, chopped peaches

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. almond extract

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a tube pan. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar together until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after adding each one.

In another bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt.

In another bowl, mix together sour cream and peaches. Alternate adding dry ingredients and peach mixture to butter/sugar mixture. (Begin and end with dry ingredients.) Stir in vanilla and almond extract. Bake for 75-80 minutes. Makes 1 cake. ♦



Bob was especially active in the Rotary's work to eradicate polio. As a leader of the Rotary International's Polio Plus program in eastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey, he raised \$6 million more than twice the target. In about half a century, this terrible disease has been all but wiped off face of the earth. In recognition of his many contributions. Bob received the Rotary International's "Service Above Self" award in 1996.

Other organizations also benefited from Bob's service. From 1958 to 1966. he was a director of the United Fund of Greater West Chester (now United Way of Chester County) and served as its president. He served on the Board of Directors and as President of the Alumni Association of Ursinus College and on the alumni association of Thomas Jefferson University. The Chamber of Commerce of Greater West Chester honored Bob with the 1981 Outstanding Citizen

Although Bob retired from medicine in 1994, he continues to serve people as a "sociological epidemiologist." He authored an important historical study of local medical services, entitled The Evolution of Health Care in West Chester 1779-1999. And in his latest book, scheduled for publication this year and tentatively titled My Uncle Sam Needs a House Call, he worries about America. believing that the country is in the latter stages of Toynbee's "comfort, affluence, greed, and apathy" cycle.

Despite the work, Bob finds time for recreation, often playing the piano and listening to classical music. He tends his flower and vegetable garden, plays golf and enjoys spectator sports.

As volunteers, Bob and I share the same values in health care, education and community service, remembering always "sharing and caring" and "service above self." Our friendship has been a long and pleasant one.

Thank you, Dr. Poole, for the pleasure of working with you. I hope we may continue "living the good life."
