## Taking young riders to horse shows is a snap. It may snap your mind, your back and your pocketbook.

h yes, I remember those days well. Admittedly, I am responsible for starting it all by buying my boys ponies to ride on our new farm. My thought was that they just might like to join their friends competing in the most novice of equine competitions.

"Wouldn't you like to go to shows with your friends?" I asked. And so it began.

#### It All Begins With Lead Line

Indeed, they would and did enjoy the shows, beginning at the easiest level in lead-line classes at local equestrian competitions in rural Maryland. It seemed innocent enough.

I realized early on that lead line was

aptly named as the first rung on the horse show ladder, leading to short stirrup, pony hunter, junior hunter and junior jumper classes. Each class, of course, calls for increasingly better riding skills, more talented horses and much higher levels of mothers' patience.

We began with small schooling competitions. These "fun" shows, as they were called back then, were warm-ups to more challenging classes as the boys began to set their sights on the "big time," a.k.a. Devon, one of the best-known horse shows in the world.

"Please mom, that's the best show in the universe. Please can we go?" they begged in unison. And so we did.

#### **Best Show in the Universe**

Anticipation for our inaugural trip to the big time kicked into high gear with approximately 22 trips to the tack shop to find the boys matching jackets, riding britches and handsome new hard hats unscarred by low hanging branches and water pistols battles.

It was also essential that their mother buy a new ensemble, preferably monogrammed with ponies and topped off by a spiffy straw hat, under which she could unobtrusively stand at ringside biting her fingernails.

Obviously, the ponies were also in need of an updated wardrobe. This makeover included new bridles and halters of butter-soft leather with tiny brass nameplates, and light blankets, embroidered on the side with their names — their real names, not the ones I called them when trying to catch them in the pasture.

Nor could the ponies be expected to ride in a trailer unless it had fresh paint, brand new floorboards, rotated tires and the farm name elegantly hand-stenciled on the side.

After all, we were going to Devon!

#### **Devon Bound**

Packed up and mostly organized, we were heading for the revered Pennsylvania show grounds before dawn. Normally a three-hour drive, it took us six, including a snack stop, lunch break, four restroom pauses (none of which coincided with food stops) and a 45-minute delay at the toll booth.

It was mid-afternoon when we pulled into the Devon show grounds, low on patience and even lower on gas. The station wagon had averaged approximately 800 feet per gallon while pulling its load. As I turned into our designated parking space, the car radiator and I heaved simultaneous sighs of relief.


We had arrived at Devon.

Though the lure of the Ferris wheel and Country Fair games was more powerful than the prospect of bedding down cranky ponies, all dimes and nickels were withheld until the ponies were bathed, groomed and tucked in for the evening. The braiding yarn was hanging in readiness to be woven in their freshly shampooed gray and black manes.


And oh, how I'd worked learning to braid properly, practicing at all those

early schooling shows. I was now well aware that the usual six fuzzy clumps knotted together with rubber bands wasn't going to cut it. After all, this was Devon.

Before heading for the hotel, we double-checked entries, toured the fairgrounds one more time in case we'd missed anything, and gave the ponies their good night carrots and hugs.

The first walk/trot class was scheduled for 9 a.m. the next morning, which meant rising before dawn. So, two pillow fights and half a "Swamp Thing" movie later, we were all sound asleep.

#### **Magic of the Oval**

Dressed in their show-ring finery an hour before sunrise, the boys' help consisted of standing propped up against the stable wall in a mostly successful attempt to

remain unsullied, while I tidied stalls and braided brightly colored yarn in the ponies manes.

With a "leg up" in the saddle as the "walk/trot on your own" class was announced, I wished the boys good luck and watched them trot smartly into the ring.

I longed for a nap.

Then, automatically, the magic of Devon kicked in as a dozen or so

fresh-faced youngsters astride their spanking clean ponies entered that very special Dixon Oval, where little hooves have echoed over countless decades.


Beginning that moment and lasting all weekend, my young riders shared the delight of Devon fun (and Devon fudge). They enjoyed the thrill of hearing their numbers announced among the winners, but managed brave smiles when their numbers weren't called.

It was an unforgettable weekend of

too little sleep and too much pizza, a smorgasbord of fairground fun against a staccato of hoof beats as novice and worldclass riders strutted their stuff.

Propped up against the fence, straw in my hair and rub rag hanging from my pocket, I knew then that every minute had been worthwhile. And I still do.

ver a century ago, a group of foxhunting enthusiasts who owned some fancy horses pooled their resources to purchase a swath of prime Chester County property suitable for hosting horse shows, creating a venue where they could strut their stuff in style and to promote the breeding of superior horses for new area residents.

Today more than 400 equestrian enthusiasts own coveted Devon Horse Show boxes, which are passed down from generation to generation. And more than 100,000 paying guests attend the country's oldest and largest outdoor, multi-breed show here each May, helping to add to the nearly \$14 million contributed since 1972 to Bryn Mawr Hospital, the current event beneficiary.

#### **Starting from Scratch**

Starting literally from scratch, the group organized the first competition in 1896, creating a two-day show that drew competitors from a s far as Lionville and West Chester to the former Devon Race Track and Polo Grounds.

Bringing their own seats, food and competitive spirit, enthusiastic riders offered spectators a total of 28 classes of events that included "a little bit of everything for everyone," from harness and saddle horses to heavy and light hunters and children's ponies, foreshadowing the variety at today's Devon.

One report of this inaugural year boldly stated, "The hobnobbing of the belles of the town with the rugged rustics is one of the picturesque incidents which demonstrated how beneficial such efforts are in bringing human elements together for the attainment of proper and humanizing civilization."

#### **Largest Outdoor Show**

Although no show was produced throughout the decade of war years between 1900 and 1910, its greatly anticipated revival the next year offered competitors and spectators a one-day event that, by 1914, had grown to become the largest outdoor horse show in the world and raised more than \$9,000 in emergency aid for soldiers overseas.

"History reveals no older friend of man than the horse, helping increase funds necessary to comfort and well being of our men 'over there,'" read a report from the Devon archives. The show was so successful that it continued as a "worthy charity," funding numerous beneficiaries over the years.

#### **Wanamaker Oval**

Delighted with the show's resurgence after the war, top equestrian competitors



from across the country traveled to the newly organized Devon Horse Show, eager to compete in the famous Wanamaker Oval, named for prominent horse show founder, William H. Wanamaker.

In addition to the generosity of the Wanamaker family, other major contributors have assured Devon's expansion and continued success. Eugene "Fitz" Dixon's magnanimous contributions spurred the show's local expansion as

well as its international reputation. In 1990 the center ring was renamed in Dixon's honor.

Hope Montgomery Scott, a grand dame of the Main Line, will always be remembered as "the heart of the horse show." Longtime Chair and Executive Director of the Show, Mrs. Scott was also an accomplished rider whose equestrian expertise assured her a share of trophies won over six decades of com-

peting. Noted as the inspiration for the character Tracy Lord in the Broadway play and film "The Philadelphia Story," Mrs. Scott's free-spirited style and elegance underscored her reputation as the original "IT" girl.

Also known as an extraordinarily good sport, she once hopped on a Texas Longhorn, riding him around the Dixon Oval to resounding applause. It was "great fun" said Mrs. Scott, who also delighted spectators with equally entertaining trips around the Dixon Oval on an ostrich and a trained buffalo.

#### **Country Fair**

Devon's appeal was also enhanced when, in 1919, the Country Fair became an essential part of the event. An "Easy Street" of thatched roofed shops was created in "Happy Village" to house a cafeteria, market house, shops and amusements. That first year the Fair donated \$26,000 to benefit Bryn Mawr Hospital, a good start toward its \$14 million in contributions.

Since those early years when the Fair was run exclusively by women who made the food and filled the volunteer positions, this unique organization now "has nearly 100 Chairmen and 3,000 volunteers," says Bobbi Cowley, a volunteer since 1981 and Executive Committee member since 1991, who is creating a history of the Fair.

Going through old scrapbooks and archives, Bobbi is working to preserve and protect the rich history of the Fair.

#### History of Wells Fargo 2011 Devon Horse Show Sponsor

Henry Wells and William Fargo would have felt right at home at Devon. Tough Western pioneers and superb horsemen, the duo carved an indelible and lasting name for themselves by delivering mail and goods by pony express during our young country's wild and wooly 1800s.

Expanding their services, the duo then created the first regularly scheduled long distance six-horsepower stagecoach business, delivering gold, goods and mail back and forth across the often dangerous frontier. Thundering across rough terrain at a flat out 5 m.p.h. with their precious cargo, the drivers changed to fresh horses every 12 miles at "home stations."

Their reputations for carrying money and valuables on their coaches made for treacherous traveling, and between 1870 and 1884 a total of 347 robberies were attempted. Relentlessly pursued by fearless agents, however, 226 of the felons, including the infamous Black Bart, were eventually captured.

By 1888, Wells Fargo had the distinction of becoming America's first nationwide express company, and by 1918 an astounding 10,000 of their offices were scattered across the globe.

As they continued to expand across 3,000 miles of Western Union territory, Wells Fargo phased out the pony express in favor of deliveries by steamships and the railroad.

But it's still the stagecoach that most people forever link to Wells Fargo, and indeed, many of their horse-drawn fleet are still "working" today. Ten original six-horse coaches remain on display in Wells Fargo's history museums, three authentic reproductions are showcased in their office buildings and a fleet of 17 roll across the countryside for events most weekends.

Shifting to modern times, such updated conveniences as drive-up tellers, banking online and ATM credit cards are all Wells Fargo initiatives. Recently Wachovia Bank became part of the Wells Fargo family, adding their 63,000 banking stores around the country.



#### **A National Horse Show**

The fourth American horse show to be designated as a U. S. Equestrian Federation Heritage Competition, member of the National Show Horse Hall of Fame and multiple recognitions as the Horse Show of the Year, Devon's success lies in its extraordinary appeal to spectators whose interests range from small pony lead line classes to international Grand Prix jumping competitions with Olympic riders, a popular event added in the 1960s.



#### **Highlights for 2011**

Noted exhibitors this year include accomplished equestrian, Jessica Springsteen, daughter of renown musician Bruce Spingsteen. Jessica looks forward to coming to Devon every year. "It's a fun horse show," she said. "I love the Fair, and the shops. ... It's really well done. ... I enjoy it a lot."

Also returning is the daughter of New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg, Georgina, who is looking forward to competing again after a serious accident in a Syracuse, N.Y. Explaining she'd come by her love of horses naturally, Georgina said, as a youngster, her father worked in a barn in exchange for riding lessons, and her mother has always had a love for horses. Her newly published book, *The A Circuit*, is the first in a planned series of teen novels.

And look forward to seeing Olympic calibre talent on Grand Prix night, June 2, a highlight of the show.

#### **Delights for All Tastes**

Devon's magnificent Carriage Marathon, traditionally held the first Sunday of the show, complemented by pony and horse driving classes throughout the week, delights a vast audience of "horse and buggy" enthusiasts.

In past years, "star power" guests have included Dick Clark, Roy Rogers, "Hopalong" Cassidy and Gypsy Rose Lee. Each added an extra perk to the nine-day equine extravaganza.

And, once again this year, the wildly popular Dog Contest promises spectators a bow-WOW of a time.

"One of the best things about Devon is there are so many things to do and see, even if you're not a horse person, you can really enjoy yourself," said Patricia Caloia, who travels from out of state each May just so she can attend the horse show with her grandchildren. "I always watch the jumping classes," she said, "but I'm a 'fairground fanatic' so we never run out of things to do."

#### **Continuing Progress**

Beautifully maintained and improved over the decades for the enjoyment of competitors and spectators, this year

"We're just trying to make it better all the time," says Leonard King, a founding member and first president of the American Grand Prix Association. King's promotion of show jumping over the past decades has quadrupled support and interest in the sport. Current capital improvements continue to develop the exhibiting areas, stalls and fairgrounds.

King admits, "It's always a work in progress. But it's Devon, and there is no other show like it in the world." ◆



#### Unveiling the Poster

The usual excitement surrounding the unveiling of the official 2011 Devon Poster at the First Night celebration is heightened this year because of Jamie Wyeth's participation as the official poster artist. Mr. Wyeth, a thirdgeneration American artist and son of Andrew Wyeth and grandson of N.C. Wyeth, is renowned as a sensitive observer of his rural surroundings. His work has been commissioned by the U.S. Postal Service, President and Mrs. Ronald Reagan, and the U.S. Mint, among others.

In describing the featured painting used in the poster, Mr. Wyeth said of "Connemara Four": "That's Phyllis and her four Connemara ponies. . . . I wanted it to be an 'official' portrait of each one of the horses. I liked the relationship of the driver [Phyllis] to each of the animals. They would respond to her voice commands, after turning one, or both ears, in her direction."

#### **Enjoying First Night**

Held May 25th, the night before the official opening of the Horse Show, First Night at Devon allows guests to enjoy cocktails and hors d'oeuvres, while being treated to a special preview of the art, including the first look at the Devon Poster.

Guests also get the first chance to purchase the art on display and share the excitement as the Devon grounds come alive with horses and riders preparing for the next day's grand opening. •

Today there are 250 steeplechase races in the United States.

#### Classic Design, Modern Amenities


Combining local fieldstone, reclaimed antique oak flooring, period hardware and hand-forged lighting fixtures with ten-foot ceilings, spacious rooms, gourmet kitchen and high-quality construction, the main house mixes the best of classic design and modern amenities. Built just five years ago, this four-bedroom, four+-bathroom, two-story home is meant to be enjoyed.

The property's conservation easement, which allows for construction of a tenant house, ensures that the unobstructed 180-degree sunset views will be preserved. Even the swimming pool was placed so views from the home focus on the property beyond the pool—even though the elegant pergola and gardens were inspired by designs from a visit to Monet's Giverney Gardens.

#### Spectacular Views

A long, curving drive leads to the stately main house, of such timeless design that it seems part of the land-scape. But inside the Grand Foyer, tenfoot ceilings and large, modern-propor-





tioned rooms make clear this house is designed for modern living.

A view of the spacious Great Room pulls you into the main living area, toward scenic westerly vistas through walls of windows in the adjacent Sunroom. Designed for comfort and elegance, the Great Room has Old-World details – reclaimed oak floors, crown molding, pocket doors, and a corner fireplace with half-moon marble hearth and dovetail floor details. Yet the proportions and light-filled space make the room modern and livable.

Seven large windows and a beamed cathedral ceiling frame the view from the Sunroom to the pool and property beyond. Easy access to the flagstone Terrace that connects the Sunroom to the Kitchen allows for easy flow to the outdoors, perfect for entertaining and family life.

A formal Study with a wall of custom bookshelves and cabinets, corner fire-place and crown molding is reached through pocket doors. Useful as a home office, quiet retreat or formal dining room, this space is off the Grand Foyer.

Double pocket doors connect the Great Room to a chef's eat-in Kitchen, shaped to echo the Sunroom, with the same spectacular views through another wall of windows. Granite counters, butcher-block center island, top-of-the-line appliances, custom cherry cabinetry and beamed cathedral ceilings make this a room both cook and guests will enjoy.

Flowing seamlessly from the modern kitchen is the cozy Breakfast Area. Anchored by a large, fieldstone fireplace, complete with cooking crane and custom cherry mantle, this hearth room evokes an 18th-century manor house. Meals in this special space must taste better. Although no room is currently used as a formal dining room, the Study is elegant enough to serve that purpose, with built-ins for storage and display. Or the adjacent Great Room has ample room for a large dining table and is convenient to the Kitchen, through pocket doors to separate the spaces.



Other rooms on the main floor include a full bath with vaulted ceiling, an enormous Mudroom off the rear entry with a wall of closets, large walk-in pantry and custom soapstone farm sink the owners had recreated after admiring one in a Unionville shop.

#### Second Level

A graceful staircase leads past a lovely brass chandelier and handwrought wall sconces to four bedrooms, three full baths and laundry room on the second floor. Two bedrooms share a well-appointed hall bath, featuring custom cherry cabinetry.

The Master Suite is secluded at the opposite end of the hallway and enjoys sunset view through many windows. His-and-her dressing rooms with separate closets boasting many builtins (20 drawers on "his" side) make for happy coexistence. Luxurious hisand-her bathrooms are separated by a large marble shower, with state-of-theart showerheads and marble bench. A chandelier, claw-foot soaking tub, and marble-topped custom vanity are a few amenities on "her" side. A back exit is on "his."

Situated over the three-car garage, the fourth bedroom is an enormous private space with its own exit, perfect for an au pair, in-law or teenager's suite. With plumbing roughed in, this could become a separate apartment, with

space for additional rooms. An unfinished attic provides even more space.

#### Lower Level

For entertaining and family fun, the large, finished lower level offers a billiards room, card room and multi-media room, plus many storage closets, space for the home's utilities and room for a wine cellar. With high ceilings, beadboard wainscoting and natural light from glass blocks set into the patio floor above, this space is also ideal for showcasing your equestrian trophies.

he turn-of-the-century charm of Disney World's Main Street came to mind when we drove into historic downtown Phoenixville. But that's just too Hollywood. It's more Norman Rockwellian, the real thing, with appealingly diverse architecture framing the well-maintained and attractive streetscape and lively urban vibe.

The National Register of Historic Places has honored this heart of the town, which includes the former Phoenix Iron Works, with its imprimatur. So has Discover Classic Towns of Greater Philadelphia, which identifies "unique communities with rich histories where everyone can build a promising future."

In the past few years, the restaurant scene has blossomed along with the town. Bistro on Bridge is a prime example. In business since June 2009, it's a happening, popular spot that serves uptown Mediterranean-inspired American cuisine in an attractive dining room and lively sports bar. With good

weather here, the restaurant takes it outdoors, setting up bistro tables and even couches on the sidewalk, with umbrellas and heat lamps as needed. It's a stylishly contemporary spot for al fresco dining.

The weather didn't cooperate when we visited, but we had the next best thing — a window seat with a clear view of the appealing Bridge Street scene. Dark wood furniture, high-backed booths, white linens and charger plates in avocado green and deep gold shades add fine-dining touches to the modern-bistro environment. Wine-themed artwork hangs on walls painted in rich brown and terra-cotta tones.

#### From the Pacific to the Mediterranean

Co-owner Zach Hoffman says his mother's cooking influenced his love of Mediterranean dishes, many showing up on the Bistro menu. Also included are those Far East flavors we've grown to love in dishes like Asian Lettuce Wraps (\$8). The appetizer's colorful and tasty sauté of diced chicken, bell peppers in various colors, water chestnuts, with a tasty soy/ginger/garlic sauce was a winner. We couldn't decide whether the crispy lettuce for do-it-yourself rollups was the Boston or Bibb variety, but we agreed it was a perfect size. Add shrimp, and the cost is \$10.

The same can't-miss flavor blend gave the *Grilled Asparagus and Pepper Salad* (\$6.50) its pleasing Asian personality. Slender, tender stalks of asparagus crowned the sautéed red onions and peppers sprinkled with sesame seeds and served with a heap of white crispy rice noodles on the side. Other Asian starters: sesame-encrusted tuna served with seaweed salad and wasabi drizzle and salmon bites tossed in a ginger peanut sauce with a toasted sesame wonton cracker.

Mediterranean influences show up in appetizers like Caprese — grilled rustic bread topped with mozzarella, tomatoes, basil and kalamata olives; risotto balls stuffed with mozzarella; and prosciutto-wrapped shrimp with grated parmesan. Plus, steamed shrimp,

Reuben egg rolls, steamed clams, fried oysters, oysters on the half shell, mussels picante, sesame-encrusted tuna and Cubano egg rolls that include marinated pork and Black Forest ham. Rounding out the diverse list: soups like Italian sausage orzo, cream of crab and French onion, and salads, among them Caesar, Buffalo chicken, fall harvest and Bistro. The 12 different salad dressing choices emphasize the something-for-everyone theme.

Dinner was off to an excellent start.

#### Turf & Surf

Compound butter flecked with zesty bits of lemon and lime brought out the best of the *Citrus Hangar Steak* (\$17), grilled to a perfect medium rare and full of flavor. Slices of the juicy steak sat on lightly sautéed spinach sporting a little oomph of garlic. The steak is one of Bistro's best sellers.

There's something about saffron that always appeals and not only because it's the world's priciest spice. It's that distinctive taste and how it colors as well as flavors food. A shining example was the Saffron Crab Salmon (\$22), a gently blackened, moist fillet topped with a saffron cream sauce that was a beautiful shade of vellow dotted with bites of crab. Delicious. Compatible partners were saffron risotto and plain steamed broccoli, which was perfect because there were so many good things going on with the salmon. Bistro's wine-pairing suggestion for the salmon, Steele Shooting Star Chardonnay (\$6.50), was a bit citrusy, slightly acidic and right on.

Best selling entrees, says Hoffman, are no-filler crab cakes with fresh citrus remoulade; lobster ravioli finished with baby spinach, bell peppers, bacon and roasted-garlic Alfredo sauce; and portobello stuffed with crabmeat and shrimp. Other options include prosciutto and asparagus pasta, asiago meatloaf, chicken marsala, seafood paella, flounder roulades and pecancrusted chicken.

In addition to offering choices on side dishes, Bistro encourages guests

to tweak entrées by adding items to the basic preparation. Roasted Vegetable Pasta is a good example. You can go with the sautéed seasonal vegetables in a garlic butter and parmesan sauce over bowtie pasta or you can add chicken, shrimp or both.

There's more on the something-foreveryone menu, including "café specials" like chicken fingers and buffalo shrimp, plus a variety of pizzas, quesadillas, paninis and burgers. Everything is available in the sports bar as well as the dining room. Hoffman says the chef constantly changes the menu, keeping on top of seasonal trends and customer preferences.

#### **Sweet Things**

All-American favorites like chocolate cake, bread pudding and peach cobbler tempted, but we opted for *Carrot Cake* and *Tiramisu*, each \$5. The hefty slice of moist cake, just sweet enough, sat on a square plate, each corner decorated with chocolate swirls. Chocolate and coffee flavors mingled appealingly in the Americanized version of tiramisu.

#### There's More

Hoffman's an enthusiastic promoter of his community and industry, organizing popular events such as Restaurant Week, the St. Patty's Day Pub Crawl and Octoberfest. As Mojito season approached, he touted Bistro's many varieties, "all with fresh fruit."

When planning the 15,000 square feet of space that his business occupies, he included a second-story night-club, called Club 212, which is open on Friday and Saturday evenings. It can accommodate up to 400 people and is a popular spot for special events. ◆



#### DELICIOUSLY DEVON

verything tastes better when you eat it outside!" quips Sandra Shinners, Co-chair of the Devon Country Fair. So true when that "outside" happens to be the grounds of the Devon Horse Show during late spring.

Running May 26th through June 5th, the Horse Show and Country Fair not only celebrates our region's equestrian culture, it offers plenty of opportunities for dining al fresco. In fact, the food is as much a part of the event as the horses, and many foods are so beloved that regular fairgoers dream of them all winter.

As soon as the gate swings wide opening day, Shinners and Missy Schwartz, whose family has volunteered at the Fair for decades, line up for the Devon Special, a cheeseburger with pickles and ketchup and a generous helping of hand-cut fries. Other folks make a mad dash to the hot dog booth for a dog, a sausage sandwich or lighter fare like hummus and veggies.

#### Something Sweet

Any sweet tooth in need of a quick fix can find much to satisfy at the Fair. Kids love the soda booth's brownie with ice cream served in a miniature baseball helmet, while people of all ages flock to the fudge booth. The recipe is secret — unless you're a member of the candy committee. For the entire week before the Fair, those lucky volunteers

hold a Fudge-a-Thon, devoting hours and hours to concocting 2,000 pounds of the heavenly confection.

And then, of course, there's the iconic lemon stick — a whole lemon pierced with a hollow candy straw — that offers a taste of nostalgia with every sweet/tart sip. Only at the Devon Fair is "go suck a lemon" considered a fine suggestion!

#### Something Fancy

Fancier fare is also on the menu. In the early days of the event, ladies used to pour tea from silver urns and nibble on delicate tea sandwiches and cakes. While the silver now resides mostly in memory books, tea, both iced and hot, as well as dainty sandwiches are still very much part of the Devon culinary tradition.

This year's Tea Cart features sandwiches prepared by **Dixie Picnic** in Malvern. Chef/owner Tracey Deschaine creates traditional and contemporary versions so guests can savor the classics — watercress and cream cheese, egg salad — or treat their palate to something new, say, a roasted veggie spread on thin foccacia. Her *Tastiest Summer Tomato Tea Sandwich* is destined to become a Devon favorite, while her from-scratch baked goods, especially *Lemon Poppy Seed Scones*, have folks begging for the recipe. (I've already done the begging for you and printed the recipe below.)

Deschaine also offers her signature Upcakes. A family twist on the cupcake, an Upcake is an upside down cupcake iced on the top and sides — an absolute boon for those who usually eat the top of the cupcake and lose interest when the icing disappears!

Still another option for delicious dining is The Garden Café where guests purchase food cafeteria-style to enjoy at cloth-covered tables arranged under a large pavilion. For the past 15 years, Philadelphia's Culinary Concepts Catering has offered fresh soups, salads, entrees and desserts. Jim Israel, the company's director of off-premise catering, kindly shared recipes for two of his best sellers, Vegetable Chili and Lobster Roll.

#### For Tailgating

When the Horse Show began in 1896, guests brought their own brown bags or picnic hampers. Today, the "bring your own" spirit is alive in the tailgate competition, a showcase for the Horse Show's most creative cooks whose themed spreads range from flannel-blanket casual to white-linen formal.

Started about five years ago by Missy Schwartz and her brother Larry, the competition goes hand-in-hand with the Antique Carriage Pleasure Drive held the Sunday of Memorial Day Weekend. Competitors in the Drive set up their parties in the lower field of St. David's Church grounds, while spectators put out their feasts along the preliminary judging ring near the Church's cemetery.

A few years ago, the *County Lines* team served as judges, and I assure you we took our responsibility seriously, sampling and re-sampling every canapé, sandwich and dessert put on our napkins. To this day, we talk about the fondant-draped cakes painted with zebra stripes and leopard spots that won a blue ribbon. And Dawn Mini's zingy *Watermelon Gazpacho* will forever have a place in our palates' memories. Find her winning recipe below as well as more Devon favorites from the *Appetizers at Devon* cookbook. The

cookbook is available at the Fair and on the website (DevonHorseShow.org).

To celebrate sun-filled days and classic summer foods, come to the many tables — and booths — of the Devon Horse Show and Country Fair!

#### The Tastiest Summer Tomato Tea Sandwich

About these sandwiches, which she'll be serving at the Horse Show, Tracey Deschaine says, "Sometimes it's not a fancy recipe, but the best of nature's bounty that becomes the star! This tea sandwich is amazingly popular down South, and when you try it you'll understand why."

1½ C. butter, softened
2 T. heavy cream
½ tsp. Dijon mustard
juice of ½ lemon
salt and pepper
10 ruby ripe garden tomatoes,
heirlooms if you can get them!
1 loaf country-style white bread,
Pepperidge Farms or Arnold bread

Blend the butter, cream, mustard and lemon juice into a spreadable paste. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Boil a small pot of water. Cut a cross into the top of each tomato. Using a pair of tongs, drop each tomato into the water for a mere 20 seconds. Remove from hot water and plunge into a bowl of ice water. The skin will peel off like a glove. Cut the tomatoes into quarters and scrape out the goo and the seeds. Pat the tomato lightly with a paper towel to dry.

Spread the country bread with your butter spread. Next, place a single layer of tomato on the spread and top with another slice of bread. Trim off the edges and cut into a fancy shape — triangles, squares or spears. Take a bite and summer has arrived! Makes about 40 tea sandwiches.



- 1 large lemon
- 2 C. all-purpose flour
- 1 Tb. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt
- 3 Tb. sugar, plus some for sprinkling
- 2 Tb. poppy seeds
- 4 Tb. cold unsalted butter, cut into ¼-inch cubes
- 1 large egg
- 1 C. heavy cream, plus some for brushing on top of scones

Preheat your oven to 425°! Scones need a hot oven to turn out just right!

First, zest your lemon, making sure you don't include any of the bitter white pith. Then mix the flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and poppy seeds in a medium bowl. Add the lemon zest and mix briefly.

Now get your nice cold butter right out of the fridge and cut quickly into small ¼-inch pieces. Don't let it get warm or your scones will be duds! Put the butter in the bowl with the flour mixture and cut butter in with a pastry blender until you have only small peasize butter pieces remaining.

Now you can get your heavy cream out of the refrigerator, mix it with the egg, and place it in the middle of the flour-butter mixture. Use a large spatula to bring the mixture together.

Now turn the dough out onto a parchment lined pie pan. (It may still need some pushing together). Use the parchment paper to shape the dough into a nice round shape that fits the bottom of the pie pan and to smooth the outside edges. Try not to take too long because you want your butter and cream to stay nice and cold. Once your dough is a flat round circle, pick up the dough using the parchment paper to lift it out of the pie pan and onto a flat surface.

Divide the dough circle into eight equal portions, cutting straight down through the dough when you cut so your scones will poof up nice and pretty.

### Tips from a Veteran Tailgater

Missy Schwartz is a pro when it comes to cooking for a hungry crowd of horsey types. The trick to her legendary muffins is adding fresh or frozen fruit to store-bought mixes. In the savory department, she frequently serves filet mignon with a horseradish sauce or a grilled side of salmon, but the dish guests rave about is her spicy, sweet ham. Missy's secrets: get a bone-in ham; it's sweeter. Make sure you include ground cloves in the spice mixture and serve with pickles, Swiss cheese, brown and rye bread and rolls.

#### Missy's Spicy Sweet Ham

- 1 large ham, uncooked
- 1 C. brown sugar
- 1 C. honey
- 3/4 cup mustard (a combination of spicy, yellow or Dijon works well) hefty dashes of ground spices: cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, allspice and cloves
- 1 can chunk pineapple in juice

Preheat oven to 350°. Make the glaze by combining brown sugar, honey, mustard and spices.

Place ham so it sits flat in an ovenproof dish or roasting tin. (You may need to cut off a little piece at the bottom to accomplish this.) Using a sharp knife, make a crisscross pattern on the top of the ham. Pour glaze on ham.

Cook 20-30 minutes per pound, basting every 15 minutes with the glaze. If the glaze gets too thick, thin it with pineapple juice. At the end of cooking, add the chunks of pineapple and baste again. Serves 4 per pound of ham.

Take your scones and place them separated on a baking sheet. Brush the tops with some heavy cream and sprinkle with about a tablespoon of sugar (preferably raw sugar).

Pop them in the oven quickly so the heat doesn't lower! Bake for 8-10 minutes or until light golden brown on top. They are especially yummy if you top with fresh lemon curd! Makes 8 servings.

#### Vegetable Chili

Jim Israel of Culinary Concepts says this healthy chili is a best seller at the Garden Cafe. He offers it topped with sour cream, shredded cheddar cheese and chopped onion.

11/2 Tb. vegetable oil

- 1 C. yellow squash, cut into ½-inch dice
- 1 C. zucchini, cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 1 C. red bell pepper, cut into ½-inch dice
- 1 C. onion, cut into ½-inch dice
- 1 C. carrots, cut into ½-inch dice
- 11/3 pints crushed tomatoes
- ¼ C. tomato juice
- 11/3 C. chili sauce
- 1 qt. canned red kidney beans, rinsed
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> Tb. chili powder
- 11/3 Tb. ground cumin
- 1 bay leaf
- 11/3 Tb. Louisiana Crystal Hot Sauce
- 1½ Tb. brown sugar
- 1 C. bulgur, uncooked salt and pepper, to taste

In a large stockpot, sauté the cut vegetables in oil for 10 minutes. Add tomatoes, tomato juice, chili sauce, kidney beans, spices and hot sauce. Simmer for 1 hour, adding the brown sugar toward the end of this time. When flavors have blended well, add bulgur and simmer for 5 more minutes. Adjust seasoning to taste. Makes 2.5 quarts or 10 1-cup servings.

#### Lobster Roll

Culinary Concepts proves that lobster needs little dressing up to be spectacular!

1¾ lb. lobster meat

1¼ C. good-quality mayonnaise

1¼ C. celery, finely diced

1/2 Tb. (or to taste) fresh tarragon, chopped

salt and pepper to taste

½ head Romaine lettuce, washed and dried well

10 hot dog or Italian rolls

Pick the lobster free of shells, and rough chop the meat. Combine all ingredients, except lettuce and rolls. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Place a lettuce leaf inside a hot dog bun and top with 3 oz. of the lobster mixture. Makes 10 servings.

#### Blue Ribbon Watermelon Gazpacho

In this chilled soup, Dawn Mini balances sweet, tart and hot with panache. Make the soup the day before. It can last up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator.

1 small red onion, roughly chopped

- 1 medium cucumber, peeled, seeds removed, cut into chunks
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 large yellow pepper, roughly chopped
- 1 tsp. salt
- 6 C. watermelon, seeded and chopped
- 4 Tb. mint leaves, chopped
- 3-5 drops hot sauce juice of 3 limes
- 1 Tb. olive oil

In a food processor, purée all ingredients to desired consistently. Chill thoroughly. Makes 8 cups and serves 6-8.

Note: If your food processor is small, process ingredients in steps. Dawn frequently processes the salt and mint together, then watermelon and hot sauce, and last, the veggies and remaining ingredients. After each step, she removes the combined ingredients to a large bowl, and at the end, stirs everything together.

#### **Devon Derby Punch**

Served at the Devon Derby Tea every year, this punch will quench the thirst of 30 or 40 of your closest friends.

orange juice and fresh strawberries, enough to fill a ring mold

- 2 bottles (750 milliliter) Champagne
- 4 quarts ginger ale
- ½ gallon orange sherbert
- 1, 12 oz.-can frozen lemonade concentrate
- 1, 10 oz.-package frozen strawberries

sherbert, lemonade concentrate and frozen strawberries in a large silver punch bowl and mix gently. Float the ice ring in the punch. Ladle into punch cups.

#### Blue Cheese Puffs

A favorite of Sandra Shinners, these puffs are often served in the Blue Room, where the chairpeople of the Devon committees relax and socialize.

½ C. (1 stick) butter8 oz. blue cheese, crumbled1, 10-count-can refrigerator biscuits

Combine the butter and cheese in a saucepan and cook over low heat until blended.

Cut the biscuits into quarters. Arrange 2 inches apart on a baking sheet. Put the cheese mixture over the biscuits. Bake at 350° for 10 minutes or until brown. Serves 10-12.

#### Cocktail Franks in Bourbon Sauce

The funniest recipe in *Appetizers at Devon* gives the following instructions: "Travel to the Lancaster County Farmers Market in Strafford and purchase at least three party dogs per person or more depending on your guest list and whether or not any of them are former Nathan's Famous Champions . . . Serve hot while soaking up the compliments." If you're willing to put in just a bit more effort, follow this classic Devon recipe for little "dogs." Guests with both simple and sophisticated palates will want way more than 3!

2 Tb. butter

1 small onion, finely chopped

½ C. bourbon

34 C. packed dark brown sugar

2 Tb. cider vinegar

1 C. ketchup

1 Tb. Worchestershire sauce

1 tsp. Tabasco sauce

1, 14-to-16-oz. pkg. cocktail franks

Melt the butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Add the onion and sauté until tender but not brown. Remove from the heat and stir in the bourbon. Return to the heat and cook for 1 minute longer, stirring occasionally. Add the brown sugar and vinegar and cook until blended, stirring constantly. Mix in the ketchup, Worchestershire sauce and Tabasco sauce. Cook until heated through.

Taste and add additional bourbon and brown sugar, if desired. Add the franks and stir until coated. Let stand until the franks warm in the sauce and serve. Serves 10.

#### Bloody Marys on a Stick

For a spicier flavor, add hot sauce and red pepper flakes to these refreshing summer party appetizers.

2 small containers ripe cherry tomatoes

1/2 bottle (750-milliliter) good-quality vodka

1 tsp. sea salt, or to taste

1 tsp. ground cumin, or to taste

Pierce each tomato in a few places with a wooden toothpick. Combine the tomatoes and vodka in a large bowl and mix well. Stir in the salt and cumin. Marinate for several hours, or for the best flavor, marinate 8 to 10 hours. Drain, reserving liquid for the "real" Bloody Marys.

Serve in a large bowl with wooden skewers. Place small bowls of sea salt and cumin by the tomatoes for additional dipping. Serves 10-12.

#### Devon Turf Club Miniature Burger Bites

A French twist on an American favorite.

1 lb. ground beef salt and pepper to taste oregano to taste garlic powder to taste basil to taste 1 baguette, cut into 24 slices ½ C. sour cream 3 to 4 Tb. horseradish paprika (optional)

2 jars lumpfish caviar, strained
(Romanoff preferred)
lemon wedges and parsley springs
for garnish

Mix the cream cheese and sour cream in a bowl until blended and spread over the prepared layers. Chill, covered, for 3 hours or longer.

Just before serving, spread the caviar over the top of the chilled layers. Run a knife around the edge of the pan to loosen, and remove the side. Garnish with lemon wedges and parsley. Serve with assorted party crackers to 12. ◆


