

UR INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS HAVE DISTINguished themselves by training student-athletes. Haverford and Agnes Irwin in lacrosse. Malvern Prep in baseball. Padua in softball. Friends' Central in track. Skill and effort on the field is complemented by diligence and effort in class. The combination has proven very attractive. Many go to choice schools.

THREE #1 TEAMS IN BOYS' LACROSSE

The Hoverford School was ranked 1st in Pennsylvania and 13th in the nation. Coached by John Nostrant, the team finished the season 18-3 and topped the Inter-Ac League, with seniors TJ Malone, Luke O'Grady and Scott Deck leading the attack. Malone is headed to Amherst and O'Grady to Providence University. Deck may try to walk on at Notre Dame.

Also 1st, this time in Delaware, was the Solesianum School's lacrosse team. Four times straight they've topped Delaware's high schools. Led by seniors, the team is sending Brett Hobbs to Penn State, Patrick Drake to Fairfield, Brady Emmi to Salisbury, Cooper Urban to Rensselaer Polytechnic and Carson Salvo to St. Leo. According to Coach Bobby Healy, "all have had outstanding careers both academically and athletically." Bishop Shanahan also finished 1st and was ranked 5th in the state. In Class 2A of the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA), the Eagles captured their first-ever statewide championship.

AGNES IRWIN & VILLA MARIA TOP GIRLS' LACROSSE

Clinching the Inter-Ac title, Agnes Irwin finished the season, 17-6. Maria Pansini, senior co-captain, was outstanding all season. Coach Lauren Wray said she "domi-

nated all over the field." She's "reliable and competitive and is great leadership on our team." Next year she'll play at Princeton.

The Hurricanes of Villa Maria Academy lost only twice in the regular season, shut out the Catholic Academies conference, then for the first time won the PIAA Class 2A championship.

MALVERN PREP FRIARS FINISH FIRST IN BASEBALL

Malvern Prep handily won the Pennsylvania state championship for the second

year in a row. The team was ranked 11th in Pennsylvania, won the Inter-Ac league, and finished 30-7 overall. Billy Corcoran, its senior captain, carried an ERA of 1.14 and was named the league's MVP. He's headed to pitch at the University of Pittsburgh next season.

Although 3rd in the Mid-Atlantic Prep League, The Hill School had several seniors selected all-league: Luke Allain, pitcher and outfielder; Daniel Monzo, catcher; and Austin Keil, first baseman. Monzo and Keil had batting averages over .425. Allain is going to Bucknell, Monzo to Muhlenberg, and Keil to Case Western.

SOFTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP ELUDES PADUA

Padua Academy finished 11-7 this season, but ultimately lost in the state tournament. Standout sophomore all-state first-baseman Zoey Jones, with a .545 batting average, has verbally committed to Florida Atlantic. Junior outfielder Katie Twardowski hit .565 and was selected allstate. Junior shortstop Catie Baxter, with a .645 batting average and an on-base percentage of .790, was selected to the 2nd all-state team.

TOWER HILL JUNIOR IS UNDEFEATED IN TENNIS

Robby Ward of Tower Hill has his sights set on the top-75 in the nation of Boys 18s tennis. A first seed in the Delaware state tournament, Ward has been undefeated for three seasons—he last lost in 8th grade in the state tournament finals.

BOYS EXCEL ON AREA TRACKS

Bishop Shanchan sophomore Jonah Hoey—the younger brother of senior Josh Hoey, who is the #1 high schooler in the country and ran a 4:07 mile at the Millrose Games—was #2 in the mile at the PIAA district finals, with a time of 4:21. In the 400 meters, senior Rick Zink ran 48.6, winning by less than .2 of a second.

Senior Elias Lindgren is Episcopal Academy's premiere mid-distance runner. He won the 800, 1600 and 3200 meters at the Inter-Ac championship: only one of four Inter-Ac runners to ever accomplish that feat. With a 4.1 average, he'll be going to Williams College.

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Monday Closed

Julian Klenner, the co-captain of Westtown School's track team, claimed 1st place in the 200 and 400 meter runs at the Friends Schools League championships and PAISAA (Pennsylvania Independent Schools Athletic Association), where he holds the records for both events.

DYNASTY CREATED AT FRIENDS' TRACK

The Friends' Central School girls' track team, led by seniors Ava Forman and Gabrielle Wilkinson, won the Friends League championship. Forman won the javelin and 100 and 300 meter hurdles; Wilkinson, the 800 and 1600 meter runs. They also inspired underclassmen to other 1st place finishes, including freshman Inara Shell and sophomores Rebecca Wucinich and Izzy McFarlane. The 4x400 and 4x800 meter relay teams also won.

And FCS won the PAISAA track championship for the first time in history. Coach Michelle Crowley proudly praised Forman and Wilkinson for their "outstanding performances on the track and outstanding presence of mind on and off the track." They're headed to the University of Florida and Washington University, respectively.

Senior Kayla Woods has captained The Totnall School's girls' team for two years. She runs-her 400 meter mark is 57 seconds, her 200 meters is 25 seconds, her 100 meters is 12.3 seconds—and she jumps —scoring 19'8" in the long jump and 5"4" in the high jump. Next year, she'll attend Richmond University. Her spirit is rubbing off on her sophomore sister Kimmi, who is already "breaking class records ... and winning major competitions," according to Coach Patrick Castagno.

Padua School senior Lydia Olivere has "re-written the record books and is the most accomplished distance runner to come through its cross country and track and field programs," says Coach Marnie Guinta. Olivere holds 18 school records, 2 Delaware state records, 2 state meet records, 12 team state titles, and 25 individual state titles. Next year, she'll attend Villanova University.

In retrospect, 2018 will be viewed as a great year for independent school sports. Our students succeeded, some on a national scale.







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The new Guinness factory, reminiscent of the one at St. James Gate in Dublin, partially opened in late 2017. But alas, it's still under construction. Currently Guinness America makes only Blonde Lager, aimed at the U.S. market. Its signature Draught Stout and Extra Stout are brewed in Ireland.

After the brewery, we're ready for a nap back on the boat. At about seven, we rouse and take a long walk to the Thomes Street Oyster House in Fells Point, a hip and historic neighborhood. Crowds are already gathering for fireworks.

Thames Street is, again, a seafood feast. We share fresh oysters for appetizers and entrees that come from well beyond the Chesapeake: scallops from Block Island; fish and chips from the Georges Banks. Three of us share baked Maine lobster-fresh and sweet.

After dinner, we head for the Domino Sugars sign, large enough to contain a major league infield; a waterfront view of Fort McHenry, home of the Star-Spangled Banner-oh, say, can you see-and fireworks. The fireworks are brilliant, amazing! For nearly half an hour, they streak over the Baltimore skyline.

At ten, we walk back, past boats, cobblestone streets, and neat, brick Federalist buildings. The mood on the street is celebratory, almost raucous, but we're tired after a long day. We catch the last water taxi back to the marina, admiring the view. We'll sleep in tomorrow.

After a late brunch, we divide up again: two to Camden Yards-there's no game but it's ranked #2 among ballparks by Forbes-and four to the Baltimore Museum of Industry. Both of our "teams" enjoy their picks. The Camden Yards pair were impressed with the architecture. Those at BMI especially enjoyed the Cannery and the Pharmacy. Given more time, we'd visit the world-class Walters Museum and the Science Center or Ripley's at Inner Harbor. Alas, we're on a schedule.

By five, we're back at the boat. And quickly, we're off. The Baltimore skyline disappears behind us. By midnight we've dropped our sails in a river north of the Bay Bridge, anchored and settled with rum in the cockpit. Another long day but we agree: whether by boat, rail or by car, Baltimore is a great

port-of-call.

ULY 3, ABOUT 5 O'CLOCK. THE WIND IS BRISK FROM the southwest: a thunderhead is on the horizon. The main waterway U into Baltimore Harbor-the Potopsco River-is wide, slightly choppy and very busy. Boats of all sizes, from ships-a freighter slows down in the traffic-to sailing yachts on day cruises on the Chesapeake Bay, to small sailing dinghies, bouncing adventurously through the spray.

Baltimore! Its Day 3, of a week-long vacation cruise on the Bay. Tacking toward the Francis Scott Key Bridge, the crew and I-six of us-are alert to the changing waters, criss-crossing wakes and unpredictable seamanship of weekend captains.

In the near distance are the old steel yards, the colorful aquarium, the cityscape of Inner Harbor and downtown Baltimore.

We dock at Inner Harbor Marina, clean the boat, change and eagerly seek a local brew and local crabs. We're famished!

We've got choices within walking distance-the Rusty Scupper, McCormick & Schmick's, Phillips Seafood, Riptide by the Bay, Captain James Crabhouse-but we're not interested in walking far. Nick's is only 15 minute away.

RBOR FOR JULY FOURTH

We order rounds of beer and plates of crabs-lots of them-big, hard-shelled, steamed red, Maryland blue crabs. Picking, picking.... It's a sailor's feast.

On board again, we watch the moonrise, then, one by one, fall asleep in our bunks.

Next morning, July 4, we split into two groups-some headed to the National Aquarium and others to the American Visionary Art Museum. Both are close.

The National Aquarium is supposed to be-it's got my vote-the best in the U.S. It's huge, housing a rain forest, live coral reef, shark tank, sea birds, crocodiles, alligators, jellyfish and much more. It's only 9 a.m., so we beat the crowd. Almost.

The American Visionary Art Museum is America's official museum of unofficial art. Intuitive, individual, inventive and inspired, visionary

art is produced by the self-taught. But they're not using crayons. Oils, watercolors, metal sculpture, newsprint, scraps of paper or string ... With 4000 works continuously rotated, the

exhibits are always fresh.

At noon, we head for Inner Harbor's food court to discuss our next stop. A brewery is on our list, but which one? Heavy Seas, Union Craft, Monument ... There are several.

We settle on DuClaw Brewing. In addition to Sweet Baby Jesus, a chocolate peanut butter porter (so good you'll say its name) there are over 70 beers produced here—about 10 stouts, several porters, a host of IPAs, amber and brown ales, and more. We can easily pass the afternoon.

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LTHOUGH THE TERM GAINED POPULARITY DURING the not-so-great recession, staycation is still useful for L those of us who live in an area packed with attractions. The Guide that follows this article includes world-class gardens and sights that bring millions of tourists to our area.

So, why not staycation this summer? Forego hours in TSA lines or packed highways. Enjoy some of the local delights our area offers. And because the Dow is a comfortable multiple of its most recent low (6,443.27 on March 6, 2009, if you care to remember), do it in style and spend some of those portfolio earnings.

Let's go to ... King of Prussia, where shopping, dining, gambling and entertainment reign supreme. It's close, accessible by Routes 202, 76 and the Turnpike. Perfect for a long weekend.

To make it extra fun, stay at the newly renovated—to the tune of \$6 million spent on 150-some rooms-Valley Forge Casino **Resort**. Having resort as part of the name already makes it sound like fun. In fact, they have Valley Beach with 20,000 square feet of pool, cabanas, tiki bar, and "sandy beach" area, plus bands playing throughout the summer.

Though located near the Valley Forge National Park, the Casino Resort is better known for the 600 slot machines and 50 table games (blackjack, craps, roulette, pai gow poker, baccarat) calling you to while away some vacay time. With 100,000 square feet of conference and event space at the hotel, you may just find another diversion on site-like a sports memorabilia convention and sale.

What else to do this staycation?



ENTERTAINMENT

Beyond the expected activities of shopping and dining, KOP offers surprisesescape rooms, axe throwing and simulated sky-diving. This is not your grandmother's KOP.

Escape rooms are all the rage, so indulge yourself and visit both sites. Choose the Revolutionary Spies theme for a regionally and historically relevant challenge at Escape Room Mystery. Will you help save our fledgling nation? Or if the lure of the casino has you thinking dollar signs, try the Bank Heist option at Expedition Escope. Feel free to try all the puzzles at both places.

Another trend, this one more challenging than puzzle solving, is axe throwing. Like curling, competitive axe throwing is wellknown in Canada, but not so much in the U.S. It's described by Bury the Hatchet as similar to darts but with axes and a wooden target. It's BYOB and BYOF (food), for 15 and older, wearing the required closed-toe shoes. For safety, of course.

For excitement without deadly weapons, try iFly KOP, where you can experience the thrill of skydiving and pretend you're President Bush #1 on a birthday. Get blown away as you float atop a rush of air in a vertical wind tunnel and experience a 13,000-foot freefall outfitted in helmet, flight suit and goggles. Upgrade the experience with the virtual reality option. You'll get a personalized flight certificate and can add photos and video to commemorate your "jump."

Back at the hotel, there's a different kind of entertainment available where others exert themselves. The Vault is a performance venue, with drinks and light fare, in the lower level of the Radisson Hotel (connected underground to the Valley Forge Casino Resort), with comedians on Fridays and live acts on weekends. Check online for the lineup this summer. You just might catch Dueling Pianos on a return visit.

SHOPPING AND MORE

Our beloved KOP Mall was significantly upgraded with a passel of prestige boutiques a couple of years back-we're talking haute end, like Fendi, Gucci, Hermes and more of the alphabet. So window shopping in shops that curate their windows and displays with the attention of museum curators makes a delightful staycation afternoon. More options are available at KOP Town Center, a live/work/play and also shop development a few miles away. Nordstrom Rack, Ulta Beauty and REI Co-op offer different kinds of souvenirs.

KOP Town Center also hosts entertainment in its grassy town-square-like central area. Try outdoor yoga happy hour led by Stillpoint Yoga Studios on July Tuesdays and free summer movie nights on July 19 (UP) and 26 (Jurassic Park).

DINING

Venture beyond room service, the hotel food court and on-site Revolution Chop House restaurant-where carnivores can feast on 14-ounce strip steaks. KOP Town Center boasts an ever-expanding list of eateries, ranging from the delightful Duck Donuts (build your own donut) to the divine Davio's Northern Italian Steakhouse (no need to go to Center City).

Some of our other favorites include MediCi Neopolitan Pizza for authentic speckled-crust goodness eaten with knife and fork. For dinner try Founding Farmers for farm-to-table freshness or Polodor Latin Kitchen and Rum Bar, which is well described by its name.

And although it's at the KOP Mall, we are fans for the interpretive American menu at Mistral.

The Town Center offers the widest range of dining options from honeygrow and b. good, to Mission BBQ with more to come.

NEARBY

Although the Casino Resort, Town Center and Mall should be sufficient to fill your time, there are more options nearby. The trampoline park at Get Air KOP will let vou burn some calories, while the Muse Paint Bar will let you express your artistic side as you sip some wine.

For a mark-your-calendar performance, the Philadelphia Expo Center in Oaks is just 10 minutes away and hosts Cirque du Soleil July 12.

And, if you're lucky in the Casino, maybe this staycation won't cost you a dime. ♦

Longwood Gardens

A lthough open year-round, Longwood Gardens truly shines in summer when the 1,083-acre legacy of founder Pierre S. du Pont attracts a good portion of the million-plus annual visitors.

We think summer is the best time to enjoy the Main Fountains at **Longwood Gordens**, now in their second season as part of the "Festival of Fountains." Dazzling daily fountain shows featuring 1,719 jets of water, glorious gardens, live music and special events make the dancing fountains, light shows and five nights of fireworks (July 1 & 21, Aug. 11, Sept. 1 & 29) a top stop. Fountain shows through September 30.

Fabulous fountains aren't the only reason to visit what *National Geographic Traveler* calls a "National Wonder." The Italian Water Garden, aquatic garden, meadows, woodlands, new allee and grotto plus formal gardens invite leisurely strolls.

Longwood is also an entertainment venue, hosting 400 performances a year. For familyfriendly theater, see The Brandywiners performing *The Music Man*, July 26–28 and August 2–4. Classical music buffs should reserve seats for the Kennett Symphony's "A Midsummer Night's Concert" on August 18.

Picnic in designated areas or enjoy a Victory brew at the Beer Garden to extend your stay. Open daily. Rts. 1 & 52, Kennett Square. LongwoodGardens.org.





For a garden on a smaller scale, plus a world-class museum, next up is a visit to the **Brandywine River Museum of Art** on the banks of the Brandywine River. Home to works by three generations of Wyeths—N.C., Andrew, Jamie—plus regional art, American landscapes, still-life paintings and illustrations, the museum is surrounded by an extensive native plant garden studded with sculpture.

This year's major attraction, "Follies: Architectural Whimsy in the Garden," features 13 whimsical garden structures—from a faerie cottage to a Gothic Tower (in photo)—on view through January 5, 2020. Visitors may prefer to tour the gardens in a tram or meander across acres of rolling hills, streams, gardens and forests as you search for the reflecting pond, glade, azalea woods and pinetum. Catch Up On Local History

Brandywine Battlefield State Park

The rolling hills and lush vineyards now disguise the site of one of the deadliest battles of the Revolutionary War. Take in some American history at the **Brandywine Battlefield State Park**, site of this pivotal battle and now a beautiful 52-acre park. General Washington and his troops suffered a crushing defeat here at the hands of British General Howe on September 11, 1777.

Enjoy the park at special events like raspberry picking on Wineberry Days through July or Colonial Dancing on July 21, Aug. 18 and Sept. 22. Come back Sept. 11 for Remembrance Day with costumed reenactments and the ringing of the 9/11 bells.

Drive through the park and find a picnic spot among the rolling hills and shady woods or catch a 20-minute film and historical artifact exhibits at the Visitors Center. *Open Tues.–Sun. Rt. 1, Chadds Ford. BrandywineBattlefield.org.*

Start with a visit to a period-perfect reproduction fieldstone barn/museum and headquarters of the **Chadds Ford Historical Society**, plus two 18th-century restorations: the **John Chads House** and the **Barns-Brinton House**, both on the National Register of Historic Places. *1736 N. Art lovers will enjoy the **Chadds Ford Gallery**, specializing in Wyeth prints, *1609 Baltimore Pk.*, while antiques lovers should browse the **Pennsbury-Chadds Ford Antiques Mall**, *640 Baltimore Pk.*

You'll also find wineries to visit here. Check out the many summer events and stylish tasting room at the Chaddsford Winery, 632 Baltimore Pk., or sample Penns Woods' wine—light and fruity traminette and sauvignon blanc to Italian-style Bordeaux. 124 Beaver Valley Rd.

Although the popular annual Chadds Ford Days is on hiatus for 2018, be sure to catch the Great Pumpkin Carve, Oct. 18–20.

TIP: The Christian Sanderson Museum is a quintessential Chester County gem. The eight-room house is full of idiosyncratic artifacts from 200 years of one man's life in Chadds Ford and a special view of our nation's history. 1755 Creek Rd., Chadds Ford.

Chester County Historical Society

Chester County Historical Society in West Chester—a repository of 300 years of local history and a great place to trace your family roots at a genealogy workshop. Through Dec. 31, learn about Chester County's diverse roots and how it became the melting pot that it is today in the exhibition, "Many Nations | Chester County." *Open Tues.—Sat. 225 N. High St., West Chester. ChesterCoHistorical.org.*

While you're in **West Chester**, check out this Great American Main Street Award-winning town that mixes the best of history with its charm. American Helicopter Museum

Lad enough history? How about a hands-on, modern museum named the best science museum for kids by *Philadelphia Magazine*? Then a visit to the **American Helicopter Museum** is for you. With a mission to preserve rotary-wing aviation history and the lifesaving role of helicopters, the museum lets you get into a real 'copter, operate the controls and fly a flight simulator. 

Learn some history of American industry, the du Pont family and DuPont corporation (inventors of nylon, Teflon and Kevlar) through exhibits and working models. Explore French-style and Italianate gardens along the Brandywine River or join the "Bike & Hike & Brews" tours every Wed. through Aug. 29. Bring your canine companion on June 27, July 25 and Aug. 29 for Dog Days of Summer. Sept. 16 is the Hagley Car Show, with 500 antique and restored cars. Open daily. 200 Hagley Rd., Wilmington (for GPS). Hagley.org.

Nemours Mansion

Temours Mansion is a 300-acre country estate that Alfred I. du Pont (1864-1935) ${f L}$ N had built for his second wife in the late 18th-century style. With almost a hundred meticulously preserved rooms on five floors filled with fine antique furniture, art from many periods, and bric-a-brac, the interior is a stunning showcase of a bygone lifestyle. The grounds are equally impressive, housing the largest formal French gardens in North America, with features such as the long walk, reflecting pool, temple of love and the maze. A chauffeur's garage houses an impressive collection of vintage cars. Open Tues.-Sun. 850 Alapocas Drive, Wilmington. NemoursMansion.org.



Surprising Lancaster County

UST TO OUR WEST, BACK IN PENNSYLVANIA, is Lancaster County, a place that may surprise you. Home to America's oldest Amish settlement, the county has plenty of horse and buggies, windmills, tidy farms and Amish cottage industries.

But there's also bustling Lancaster City, outlet shopping, American history sites, unusual museums, theaters galore, and trendy restaurants and distilleries.

We think Lancaster should be on your list of summer destinations. Details for the attractions in this section can be found at *DiscoverLancaster.com*.







Lancaster City

s the county seat, Lancaster City has energy and attractions for all ages. Sample the art and history museums—DeMuth & Lancaster Museum of Art and North Museum of Nature and Science—or browse local art galleries that host fun First Friday open houses along Gallery Row and elsewhere in this "authentic arts town."

Learn about Pennsylvania's only American President at LancasterHistory.org (that's the name and Web domain) and visit President James Buchanan's Wheatland estate.

Follow that up with a **Historic Lancaster Walking Tour** for a closer look at the city or a **Tuktuk Tour** on a motorized three-wheel rickshaw.

You can even tour a meadery for honeyed wine and some axe throwing (it is period appropriate) at **Meduseld Meadery.** Or for harder stuff, try a tour and tasting of craft rye whiskey at **Thistle Finch Distillery.**

Trains & More Trains

Train lovers must stop at Strasburg for train-themed restaurants and motels, plus a 2000-square-foot **Strasburg Train Shop**, a super store for railroadiana. Strasburg is also home to the **Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania**, housing one of the world's most significant collections of historic railroad artifacts.

Other stops include the **Strasburg Rail Road**, where you can ride a historic coal-burning steam train, and the **Choo Choo Barn**, one family's 70-year creation of an animated, hand-crafted toy train exhibit.

True fans will make a side trip to the **National Toy Train Museum** in Ronks with its world-class collection of toy trains from the mid-1800s to present for kids of all ages.

Farms & Tours

Looking for a farm experience? Try the Form Tours at Verdant View in aptly named Paradise or a farm stay at Old Windmill Form in Ronks where you can milk a cow, gather eggs, take a hay ride or pitch in with other chores. Cherry Crest Adventure Form offers 60 agritainment attractions, including a popular corn maze in the fall.

For hearty farm-fresh Amish food try the **Bird-In-Hand Family Restaurant and Smorgasbord**, with 50 years of Smucker family hospitality.

If sightseeing is more your taste, try an Amish buggy ride, available almost everywhere. Or **Strasburg offers scooter tours**, **Smokehouse has helicopter tours**, and **Bird-In-Hand** is home to the **US Hot Air Balloon Team**.



Shopping

Shopping options run the full gamut in Lancaster County—from iconic Amish quilts, crafts and hand-built furniture to top national brands and luxury items at **Rockvale Outlets** and **Tanger Outlets**.

Antiques lovers may head for **Adamstown**, home to over 5,000 dealers in what's called the Antiques Capital. It's a true pickers' paradise at **Renninger's Antiques Market** for everything from vintage clothes to military memorabilia. Or pick a small shop to visit and browse.

Two fun shopping destinations in Lancaster City are the **art galleries on Prince Street** and historic **Central Market** housed in a beautiful 1889 building. Enjoy the bounty of the county as you walk the aisles lined with offerings from 60 local vendors.

More Towns to Tour

rom Blue Ball to Intercourse to Paradise, Lancaster County does not lack colorful town names. We suggest you explore. Find a favorite.

If you need a destination, then try Lititz, known as America's Coolest Small Town. Visit for fireworks at their signature event: the 201st Continuous 4th of July Celebration (since 1818) at Lititz Springs Park.

Foodies will enjoy the **Sturgis Pretzel Bakery**, where you can roll and knead your own pretzels, and **Wilbur Chocolate Factory** to taste the famed Wilbur Buds (predating the Hershey Kiss!) in addition to a variety of tempting restaurants. Other Lititz highlights include the new **Stoll & Wolfe Distillery**, offering tours, tastings and cocktails. And there's even a wolf sanctuary. Enough said?

One more idea: check out the **Turkey Hill factory tour** in Columbia, where you can make your own ice cream flavor and experience tea from around the world. All good ways to end your visit to surprising Lancaster County.

Head for Cecil County

'OW ON TO MARYLAND AND CECIL COUNTY, OUR NEIGHBOR TO THE SOUTHWEST, at the top of Chesapeake Bay, midway between Philadelphia and Baltimore. Discover charming small towns, parks with miles of trails, specialty and antique shops, award-winning restaurants, and cozy inns and B&Bs. Plenty of attractions—like the July 20-28 Cecil County Fair, Prime Outlet shopping and Maryland's first casino-make this a destination. See SeeCecil.org.

The Chesapeake Bay

or outdoor fun you can hike, bike, camp, bird watch, the Chesapeake Bay and the C&D Canal by boat or by land. Enjoy panoramic views from Turkey Point Lighthouse on a bluff overlooking the Bay or from the banks of the C&D Canal where ships from around the globe cruise.



Fair Hill

Deyond its fame as an equestrian destination for Fair Hill Races Din May and a 3-Day Eventing Competition, October 18–21, the over 5,000-acre Fair Hill Natural Resource Management Area is known for beautiful meadows, lush woodlands, historic sites and natural beauty. Once owned by William du Pont Jr., who used the property for cattle, fox hunting and steeplechase racing, the land welcomes hikers, anglers, archers and history buffs in search of Mason Dixon markers and covered bridges.

Great Outdoors


alling all boaters, fishermen, ✓ golfers, equestrians, hunters, campers, hikers and bikers! Cecil County boasts a diverse selection of state parks and forests, each with nature trails for walkers, hikers and bikers, plus wildlife highlights from birds to reptiles to fish, and nearby attractions from arboretums to winery tasting rooms. Get a copy of the Nature Guide from the tourism office.

Chesapeake City

T isit a classic town, like **Chesopeoke City**, a historic town on the National Register of Historic Places boasting 19th-century Victorian homes and shops that suggest a step back in time.

Outside of town and set in an early 19th-century pump house, the C&D Canal Museum tells the story of the 14-mile-long man-made waterway connecting the Chesapeake and Delaware Bays. Started in 1824—when workers were paid 75 cents a day to dig the 10-foot-deep, 66-foot-wide original canal-the canal, now 35-foot deep and 450-foot-wide, is the third busiest in the world and busiest in the U.S., serving 15,000 vessels a year, from pleasurecraft to transatlantic ships. Open Mon.—Fri. and weekends through Labor Day.

And don't forget to enjoy a sunset view before heading home.



Sample Maryland's Eastern Shore

ARYLAND MERITS ANOTHER STOP FOR THE FULL CHESAPEAKE EXPERIENCE, SO HEAD FOR THE Eastern Shore, across the Bay, about two hours from Chester County. At Kent County's Eastern Shore you'll find Lan area that's unspoiled, with charming waterfront towns, stretches of rolling farmlands, and miles of scenic landscape. Watch watermen hauling in their catch, cyclists cruising on untrafficked roads, and everyone from antiques lovers to Maryland blue crab lovers enjoying the special flavor of the Eastern Shore. Here are three must-see destinations, and more choices at Kent County Tourism Office, KentCounty.com.

Chestertown

hestertown, a former Colonial port, is now a well-kept historic ✓ treasure on the scenic Chester River. Take a walking tour along redbrick sidewalks past the second largest collection of 18th-century structures in Maryland. Chestertown was named by the National Trust as one of a "Dozen Distinctive Destinations," an annual list of unique, preserved communities. Visit the **Geddes-Piper House Museum** (c. 1784), 101 Church Alley, the Charles Sumner G.A.R. Hall on Queen Street (one of four Civil War Trail sites), and Washington College's historic campus-one of the ten oldest liberal arts colleges in the country and one with links to George. Enjoy performances at **Princes Theatre** and shopping at the **Chestertown** Farmers' and Artisans' Market on Saturdays, plus special events on First Fridays in a town that's a designated Arts and Entertainment District. For more, visit Chestertown.com.



Eastern Neck National Wildlife Refuge

Tature lovers will want to make time for **Eastern Neck National Wildlife** \bot **N** Refuge, for wildlife, waterfowl, birding and fantastic observation decks and walking trails, many of which lead to the water. Be sure to visit the Butterfly Observation Deck for a panoramic view of Chesapeake Bay. A birders' paradise, the refuge is sanctuary for more than a hundred thousand bald eagles, ducks, geese and swans, along with migratory songbirds and shorebirds. 1730 Eastern Neck Rd., 6 miles S. of Rock Hall, Fus.gov/Northeast/EasternNeck.



Rock Hall

To celebrate Independence Day, head southwest and find the sky L full of fireworks at Rock Holl, a fishing village—aka the "Pearl of the Chesapeake"-nestled between the Chesapeake Bay and Chester River. Once a tobacco port, then a fishing and crabbing center, the town now thrives as a sailing, boating and tourist destination and was named a best small town to visit by Southern Living Magazine. You'll find Eastern Shore flavor and character throughout the town in B&Bs, inns and shops featuring local artwork, crafts and antiques. Don't miss the many restaurants serving the freshest seafood.



Along the Main Line

ANY DISAGREE ABOUT WHAT TOWNS are included in the 20 square miles of Philadelphia's western suburbs known as the Main Line. Although some extend the area out to West Chester and Media, most agree that about 20 towns make up the Main Line neighborhoods of old money, great shopping, fine dining and outstanding schools and universities, along with some of the county's wealthiest zip codes and best collection of Welsh town names (Bala Cynwyd, Bryn Mawr, Berwyn).

In last year's guide we shared the mnemonic-Old Maids Never Wed And Have Babies-for the train stations for the eastern Main Line, representing Overbrook, Merion, Narberth, Wynnewood, Ardmore, Haverford, Bryn Mawr. Ready for a new memory aid for the western towns of Rosemont, Villanova, Radnor, St. Davids, Wayne, Stafford, Devon, Berwyn, Dayelsford and Paoli? Try Really Vicious Retrievers Snap Willingly, Snarl Dangerously ... Beagles Don't, Period. Though even that leaves out Bala Cynwd, Gladwyne and Malvern.




Tsed as a setting in literature in the 1951 *Catcher in the Rye* and 2015 Luckiest Girl Alive, and spared (so far) from being part of the Real Housewives television franchise, this 15-mile stretch, mostly along Lancaster Avenue (Route 30), got its name because it parallels the Pennsylvania Railroad's former main rail line from Philadelphia to Chicago. Railroad shareholders built lavish homes in the area, creating the core of still-highly-desirable neighborhoods.

Even now a tour of the area is a perfect diversion for those with a weakness for house porn. Roam the leafy lanes and search for a glimpse of the ten most expensive homes for sale on the Main Line-mostly in Gladwyne and Villanova—ranging from \$4.6 to \$21 million and including both historic and new construction. One even has a batting cage.

C ome of the best local shopping and dining Options are available along the Main Line. Check out Lancaster Ave.'s assortment of unique boutiques, fashionable eateries and new brewpubs. From dining with history at **Black Powder Tavern** to the latest Cali-inspired Main and Vine, there's something for every taste. See our "Best of the Best" dining coverage at CountyLinesMagazine.com.

For shopping, browse specialty shops along Lancaster Ave. in Wayne and Bryn Mawr, or stop in the shopping-centric developments of Eagle Village Shops and new-ish Bryn Mawr Village for destinations like Kirna Zabete and Athleta. Farther east is one of the country's first shopping malls. Suburban Square continues to evolve, offering everything from an Apple store to West Elm, and Lily Pulitzer to Soul **Cycle**, plus a new **Life Time Athletic** gym/spa/shared work space.



Area Gardens

Ready for a stroll? Visit one of several sublime public gardens in this leafy enclave. Wayne's **Chanticleer Garden**, a former private residence now known as "a pleasure garden," is a popular destination, as is Devon's Jenkins Arboretum with its collection of native plants, as well as Merion's Barnes Foundation Arboretum with specimen and rare plants. ChanticleerGarden.org; JenkinsArboretum.org; BarnesFoundation.org/Visit/Merion. The Haverford College campus, which is open to the public, is home to a charming arboretum of stately historic trees along with a pinetum by the peaceful 2.2-mile nature trail. Haverford.edu/Arboretum.



 $\overline{\Lambda}$ lthough no battles were fought there, Valley Forge has a singular Deplace in the story of the American Revolution. And so Valley Forge National Park preserves the heroic story of George Washington and his beleaguered Continental Army during the 1777-78 winter.

Take a ranger-led tour for an in-depth understanding on this place where history marches off the page. A walking tour from the Muhlenberg Brigade huts follows in the footsteps of the soldiers who fought to survive that terrible winter. Or a 90-minute trolley tour will give you an overview of the park's many highlights. If you have more time, a bike tour gives an even more expansive view on a five-mile loop.

Self-guided tours are another option, allowing you to choose from seeing the Visitors Center, Muhlenberg Brigade huts, National Memorial Arch, General Wayne's statue, Washington's Headquarters and more. Outside the park is another worthwhile stop, the beautiful 1917 Washington Memorial Chapel with its 58-bell carillon. In a nearby log cabin you'll find the Chapel Cabin Shop offering Revolutionary-themed gifts, artwork, books and snacks.

The Visitors Center offers maps, self-guided driving tours, ranger-led walking tours, trolley tours, podcasts and more. ValleyForge.org.





Stoneleigh

The newest addition, just opened in May, is Villanova's Stoneleigh: A **L** Natural Garden. The 42-acre piece of paradise was once the Haas family home (of Rohm & Haas) and was left to the community to enjoy. Under the stewardship of Natural Lands, the property has been revived, showcasing the stately trees, winding pathways and lush gardens that were designed by notable landscape architects over the past century-including the Olmsted Brothers, sons of Frederick Law Olmsted. StoneleighGarden.org.

Visit Valley Forge

TIP: Join Healthy Parks Healthy People for the 78 Mile Challenge-78 in honor of 1778 and Washington's army Run, walk, bike, hike or paddle along the trails, roads, and water ways in Valley Forge National Historical Park. Reach 78 miles and earn a prize

Nature is mixed with history and 75 miles of interconnected trails, including 20 miles in the Park, perfect for jogging, running, biking and horseback riding. With plenty of open space and picnic areas, the Park is meant for summer days filled with soaking up sunshine and history.

As you might expect, each year the park throws a massive community picnic on July 4th with a cookout, games, artillery demos and a reading of the Declaration of Independence. Park grounds are open year-round, dawn to dusk. Days and times vary by attraction. ValleyForge.org.

Located on 300 acres of rolling hills in southern Chester County, the Brandywine Polo Club is one of the East Coast's oldest polo establishments, dating back to 1950.



OHIOPYLE 4.5 HOUR DRIVE

F YOU'RE AN ADVENTURE SEEKER, DISCOVER IT OUT WEST IN the Laurel Highlands at Ohiopyle, PA. You'll find some of the best white water rafting and kayaking on the East Coast in Ohiopyle State Park's 19,000 acres. Choose between adrenaline-pumping, intense rapids for seasoned rafters or a more leisurely, novice-friendly float on the Youghiogheny River.

While you're there, take in the other sights including photogenic waterfalls-like Ohiopyle Folls and Cucumber Folls-and the sandstone waterslides in Meadow Run's nature-built waterpark. Land-lovers will have no shortage of things to do either with rock climbing, biking, hiking, camping and even zip lining at Ohiopyle Zip Line Adventure Park.

The Highlands are also home to PA's largest cave, the Laurel Caverns, covering three miles of passages where you can go caving-or spelunking as it's called—in the cave's natural state. *Tip:* The caves are very dark and you're required to bring at least two good light sources, so come prepared!

A final stop: Visit Frank Lloyd Wright's unique creations nearby at Fallingwater (read more in our July 2015 issue) and Kentuck Knob for architecture that's built seamlessly into its surroundings. LaurelHighlands.org.


BETHLEHEM ^{1.5} HOUR DRIVE

Once home to Bethlehem Steel—the second largest U.S. steel producer during its heyday-the city boasts the now-sleeping enormous blast furnaces of the Hoover-Moson Trestle that ran for almost a century, starting in 1907. It's now an elevated linear park that stands four stories above street level, serving as a pedestrian walkway and visitor must-see.

With over 450 performers on 14 stages, it continues to be the largest, non-gated free outdoor music festival in the country. Generations of Beauty Chester County's Whitehackle Farm

ROM THE FLAGSTONE TERACE ADORNED WITH wisteria, gaze out over the expanse of Whitehackle Farm. Every season, every day, every fleeting moment offers a sublime view.

A heron stands silently at the edge of the larger of two ponds. A yellow iris blooms. Morning sun catches a cupola above the stables. Horses gallop past an old sycamore tree and newcomer saplings, as riders race for the prize of the Pennsylvania Hunt Cup.

Like the property's sparkling stream—the headwaters of the White Clay Creek-history, home and heart flow through the farm.

HUNTING GROUNDS

In an area of southern Chester County that was once oldwood riparian forest populated by Lenni Lenape natives, in the 1920s William Ernest Carter created a lodge and surrounding space where he could hunt.

While Carter's full story remains a mystery, the avid fox hunter, polo player and wealthy son of a coal baron sought a new life outside of Philadelphia after surviving the sinking of the Titanic and a later divorce. Plunkett Stewart-a friend and famed founder of distinguished hunts and hounds-brought Carter to the countryside of West Marlborough Township.

Designed and constructed by the renowned Philadelphia firm of John S. Cornell & Sons in 1925, Carter's lodge was no mere hunting box. The two-story house, carriage house and stables with six brood-mare-sized stalls were built with matching large stone lintels and dash pointing.

Exemplary of homes designed and constructed in that period, the house and outbuildings appeared to have grown out of the ground; the home seemed to drape over the hillside. Although the box's second floor had no interior walls for separate bedrooms, the first floor's leaded windows by the front door, marble foyer, two fireplaces and six sets of

French doors leading to the back terrace formed a space of simple elegance and beauty.

Carter named it Gwenda Farm.


of the land, horses, hunt and polo continued to be stewards of the property. After Carter's death in 1940, the deed passed through interim owners.

Then in 1953 Lewis Ledyard bought the property, bringing his family and passion for fox hunting. In 2002, son Mike Ledyard—who had spent his childhood there—bought it for his own growing family and named it Whitehackle, after the family's longtime homestead in New York.



Mike Ledyard recounted the legend of his father buying the farm. Although the Ledyard family lived on Long Over the decades, owners with a love Island, his parents frequently hunted with friends John and Nancy Hannum on weekends. One day Mrs. Hannum telephoned Lewis Ledyard about a property preparing to go onto the market. Ledyard took a trip to see it. "My dad made a deal, shook hands and called my mother," said Ledyard. "Dad told her, 'I just bought the nicest farm in Unionville.' She asked the number of bedrooms. 'Two,' he replied." "Dad must have forgotten we had six kids at that time," chuckled Mike.









Ultimately, a large suite and three additional bedrooms were added to the farmhouse's second floor. With his mother as an ardent gardener, peonies, irises and lilies of the valley from Long Island accompanied the family on their move and were placed in their own beds surrounding the new Unionville house.

"As a kid, I was oblivious to architectural aspects," continued Mike. "Friends would

say it was a great place, so I was proud of it. But to me it was simply home."

As a child, on the coldest winter days Mike played with tiny toy tractors on the rug that covered the original randomwidth oak floors as sunlight streamed in through the French doors on the house's south side. During summers, he and the family raced their ponies, swimming across the larger pond built by his father.

Mike drank water straight from one of the springhouses.

"I knew every square inch of the farm. I helped build every bit of fence," Ledyard said. "It all has huge sentiment. Later in life, I began to appreciate the architectural style."

BY DESIGN

Many of the home's architectural elements and furnishings are as historically and architecturally significant as the cherished memories are sentimentally significant to Ledyard. Every attention was paid to details from the front doorknob to the plaster moldings.


According to Ledyard, when he and his wife Catherine ("Cathie") moved there, they wondered how to replace an extraordinary but dilapidated Palladian window at the end of the barn. Although he hadn't visited the loft for decades, he vaguely remembered seeing an extra window stored there. Climbing into the loft, he found an identical handmade window with matching magnificent dentils and columns-another legacy of William Carter.

Gracing the wall in one of the downstairs bedrooms is a special document: Map of Country Most Frequently Hunted by Mr. Stewart's Cheshire Fox Hounds, presented to Mrs. John B. Hannum, III, 1950, re-presented 1991. The re-presented map updated names of property owners, including the Ledyard family.

While the appointments are noteworthy, the house also has a charming, comfortable feel. "The rooms are intimate," said John Milner, Chadds Ford architect. "You feel good walking through them. Someone created a home, not just a statement."

Over time some aspects have changed. The driveway with entrances on two roads is now paved. Ledyard laughed as he recounted driving very slowly late at night so the crunch of the gravel beneath the car's tires wouldn't alert his parents to his arrival past curfew.

Lining the driveway, trees once climbed by Ledyard and his siblings are now so tall that limbs are beyond reach. Another once-small tree near the larger pond is now



a majestic oak. Herbs grow in window boxes on a deck that was added to the side of the home overlooking the farm's two springhouses.

Yellow irises by the small pond multiplied and crept downstream over the years. "Shortly after we bought the house in 2002, I asked Mrs. Hannum if we could dig a few of the yellow flowers down the road to plant by our pond," said Ledyard. "She said yes, so we dug, then planted. We found out later that it wasn't her property."

Other things haven't changed: the longstanding tradition of the Pennsylvania Hunt Cup traversing the property and the sight of the gable end of the barn from the bedroom where Mike Ledyard and, years later, his son Mikey-now in law school-slept. Views of and from the protected 68-acre farm, surrounded by protected land, cannot change because of conservation easements.

BY NATURE

Yet another important feature of Whitehackle, one with broad impact, is the freshwater spring that emerges at a dip in the land.

"The property is the birthplace of the wild and scenic White Clay Creek," said Bern Sweeney, senior research scientist at Stroud Water Research Center who has studied the stream since 1972.

"How water is treated in its infancy dictates the quality of water downstream," said

Sweeney. Thus, Chester County residents savoring local butter and cheese from downstream dairy farms, mushroom farms, neighbors in small town Avondale and the city of Newark, Delaware, as well as four-hooved friends from nearby horse farms who drink the water of the creek, all depend on the quality of the water that comes from this farm.

Stroud Center and others, 1500 trees have been planted along the creek at Whitehackle as part of a water improvement program. Because of the trees that stabilize the creek banks and their shade that stabilizes the water temperature, healthy wildlife abounds





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
